He Flashed Signals



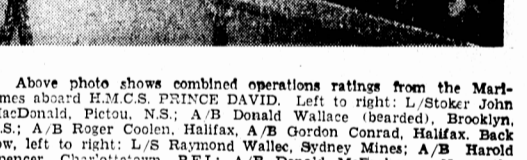

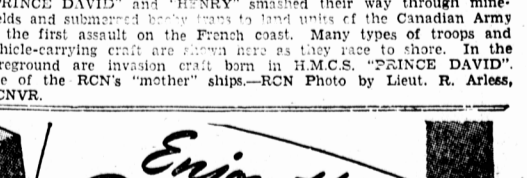
