### Livestock Report

**MONTREAL, Aug. 23.**—Live stock for sale on the two markets this morning amounted to 307 cattle, 130 hams, 1,127 hogs and 320 calves. Nearly all the cattle offered today were common bulls and canner cows. A few of the heavier bulls were sold for \$4.25 and an odd one \$4.50 but the bulk were light and brought \$3.50 to \$3.75 and \$4.00. Canner cows were slow sellers at \$2.25 to \$2.75. A couple of lots medium quality lambs were sold for \$10.50 and a better

brought \$11.00. Calves were in good demand and \$12.00 was paid for a couple of lots of fairly good weaners. Medium quality suckers brought \$11.00 and \$11.50. Mixed lots common suckers and drinkers brought from \$8.50 to \$10.00. Grassers \$5.00 to \$6.00. Hogs were poor in quality and weight. Straight lots fair quality and weight brought \$10.75 and poorer kinds \$10.50. Light hogs were penalized \$1.00 to \$1.50 per head and heavies \$2.00 per head. Thin feeder hogs were not wanted. Sows \$7.00 to \$8.00.
