The beautiful weather, delightful location and general hospitality of the Murray River people, together with the interesting and inspiring sessions, made this Rally a most successful one.

Mrs. M. D. MacDonald who presided at the afternoon session extended a warm welcome to all members and visitors. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Presbyterial President, Mrs. Hammond Toombs. With Mrs. G. Keen presiding at the organ the hymn "Wonderful Love" was sung. This was followed by prayer by Mrs. Toombs, who also gave the scripture reading from Phil. 4: 1-8. Paul seemed to have a grasp of what it is to be truly christian, and a joyous christian, enjoying the peace of God. "Whatever things are true, honest, just, pure, lovely—think on these things." Prayer by Mrs. Harold Newsome, Charlottetown, was followed by the hymn, "Breathe on me breath of God."

Mrs. W. A. Bruce, Valleyfield, was appointed Secretary, Mrs. Gordon Pringle, Montague was appointed Convener of Courtesy and Credential Committee with Mrs. Les Donald and Mrs. Jack MacPherson on Committee.

A talk on Mission Band work was given by Mrs. Gordon Pringle. **FRENCH CANADA IS SUBJECT OF LECTURE**

The afternoon session was brought to a close with prayer and benediction by the President.

Rev. T. R. Goudge, Murray River, presided at the evening session and conducted the devotional exercises. "For the beauty of the earth" was sung, followed by scripture reading and prayer, and the singing of "Go labour on."

The roll call by the Secretary showed an attendance of eighty five delegates, representing fourteen societies. Ten of these societies are from Kings Co., six presbyterial officers were present.

A much appreciated reading by Rev. Colin MacNevin, was followed by a beautiful solo by Miss Margaret Coffin.

Mrs. Hammond Toombs took for the subject of her address "The Kingdom of God movement in relation to our W. M. Society." This is not a new movement when we compare it with the words of our Master. We should live Christ. The doing of God's will should be supreme in all our relationships. To do this the foundation must be our prayer life. As stressed by the Oxford Group, the human soul must come into contact with God. Through prayer we can bless unnumbered souls.

A most appropriate solo "Just one hour with the Saviour" was sweetly sung by Miss Bertha Chapell.

The Rev. J. R. Skinner of Belle River took as his subject "The King's Highway," basing his remarks on Isa. 40: 3. "In that day shall there be a highway out of Egypt to Assyria, and the Assyrian shall come into Egypt and the Egyptians shall serve the Assyrians." Applying the words of this prophecy to religious conditions in modern Japan the speaker went on to show that the Kingdom of God movement under the leadership of Kagawa is producing wonderful results in changed lives. Nor is this work confined to Japan. In China, Korea and Manchuria, Japanese missionaries are to be found preaching the Gospel. We are seeing the fulfillment of this ancient prophecy. There is a highway out of Japan to China. Messengers of God are travelling along the King's Highway and telling the good news which they first learned from our missionaries.

The following is the report of the Courtesy and Credential Committee as submitted by Mrs. Pringle. On behalf of the visiting delegates and auxiliary members, we move that a vote of thanks be extended to the Murray River auxiliary for their very gracious hospitality, to Rev. Mr. Goudge and the congregation, to the committee in charge of the Rally, to those members of the Presbyterial Executive who brought a helpful message from their several departments, to Mrs. Toombs and Mr. Skinner for their timely messages; to Rev. Mr. MacNevin for his interesting reading; to the organist, soloists, and two Mission Band children who contributed to the enjoyment of the Rally and to those who participated in any other way.

The report was adopted. Words of welcome to delegates, visitors and presbyterial officers were expressed by the chairman.

The offering was received and the hymn "Blest be the tie that binds" was sung. A most profitable Rally was brought to a close with the benediction pronounced by Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Valleyfield.

Georges Bonnet, French Finance Minister, who has been directing operations of the gold bloc representatives, in an eloquent address declared that he thought monetary discussions had been definitely excluded by yesterday's bureau meeting.

Spokesmen for the gold countries argued almost fiercely and drew converts to their cause from Spain and the Balkans.
