NEW BATTLESHIPS BUILT BY JAPAN ARE TO FIGHT WITH EIGHTEEN INCH GUNS.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—According to reports which have reached London, the Japanese naval authorities are preparing to go to the limit in their new warships as regards size and fighting power. It is known that the first Japanese 18 inch gun has been produced and tried out and this tremendous weapon will probably represent the main armament of the Oowari class of battleships, which were authorized last year, but have not yet been laid down.

The gun took twelve months to build and has been under trial since April. It weighs 170 tons and can throw a 3,400 pound shell up to a range of 45,000 yards. At a range less than half this distance the shell, it is declared, will penetrate the stoutest armor carried by any battleship now afloat. The Oowari is designed to carry eight of these monster weapons and will therefore hurl twelve tons of steel at each broadside salvo.

Guns of the same calibre will probably be adapted for the four later battle cruisers of the eight-year programme, which are to follow the four ships of the Amagi class, but in this case the number of guns will be reduced to six a ship. Japanese naval opinion has always favored the heaviest guns that can be obtained and the decision to build an 18-inch type was taken late in 1918 after Japanese officers in Europe had inspected the experimental British gun of this calibre. Special plants were set up at Muroran and Kure for the purpose. Confidence is felt that in Japan the Oowari will outclass all other battleships in fighting employment will also register

To Establish Labor Clearing House

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 24.—Following the advice and under the direction of the employment committee of the local chamber of commerce, an employment clearing house is being established in Spokane for the coming winter. Back of the movement are the city commissioners, labor unions, commercial organizations, labor agencies, employers' associations and various societies, clubs and lodges.

The city commissioners will head the movement and the work will be under their direction. It is planned to have employers register their needs with the clearing house; all men and women needing employment will also register there, where a record will be kept of their individual qualifications. It is not expected that there will be work enough during the winter to care for an unlimited army of employees, so efforts will be confined to furnishing work to the citizens of Spokane only, men with families dependent upon them to be given preference.

Central Europe Is Full Of Hate

ROME, Sept. 24.—The Marquis della Torretta, former Italian minister to Austria, who recently went to Vienna to confer with the Austrian officials on the Burgenland situation today reported to the cabinet the result of his mission. He said central Europe was full of hate and rancor, one race against another. The "Little Entente" was displeased with the attitude of the allied powers in permitting Hungary to violate for so long the Treaty of Trianon.

Italy it was said today, had succeeded in preventing armed intervention in the disturbed area, but she was particularly concerned over supporting the opposition of the "Little Entente" to the restoration of the monarchy.
