CANNIBALISM ON ADMIRALTY ISLES

A German Warship Inflic Punishment Fire Destroys Town of Steelville, Mo.—New York Canals Paralyzed by Labor Troubles on Lakes.

BAD FIRE IN STEELVILLE. STEELVILLE, Mo., May 14.—(Special)—The entire business section of this town and many dwellings were today destroyed by fire. Loss estimated at \$100,000.

COL. SAM HUGHES IN NEW YORK

Speaking Before the Canadian Society He Advised the Members to be Good Citizens to Lay Aside All Their Racial Prejudices.

NEW YORK, May 11.—Col. Sam Hughes M. P. for North Victoria, addressed New York Canadians last evening at the Canadian Club, 846 Seventh avenue.

He first spoke of the relations of Britain and the colonies and said he anticipated a closer imperial union in the future. As to the relations of Canada and the United States he spoke of the great developments of recent years and foretold yet greater progress.

In closing he advised Canadians who intend making a permanent home in this country to lay aside that feeling which in the past has prevented British subjects from renouncing their allegiance and to take out naturalization papers and do their full duty as citizens.

At the close of the address Col. Hughes was elected an honorary member of the club.

JAPANESE ARE MARCHING NORTH

To Attack Kuropatkin, Content with Cutting Off Supplies from Port Arthur for the Present—The Russians Leave New Chwang—Secret Chino-Japan Treaty—Report that Russia May Consent to Peace on Fair Terms.

PARIS HEARS AN IDLE TALE. LONDON, MAY 14.—(Special)—A Paris telegram says a rumor is current that Port Arthur has fallen and 10,000 men were killed during the engagement.

THE JAPS MOVING ON. TOKIO, May 14.—(Special)—A detachment of Japanese troops occupied Kwan Tien Sien, 60 miles northwest of Feng Wang Cheng on Thursday.

ENCOUNTER WITH CAVALRY. The Japanese attacked and dispersed 300 Russian cavalrymen and captured a wounded officer and two men.

THEIR FRONT SPREAD WIDE. SHAN HAI KWAN, May 14.—(Special)—Japanese troops, occupied Suo Yin, sixty miles east of Liao Yang on the mail road Thursday. The number is unknown.

MORE JAPANESE LANDING. NEW CHWANG, May 14.—(Special)—Japanese troops continue landing at Pitsewo east of the city, which is now practically unprotected.

RUSSIANS LEAVE NEW CHWANG. The troops left here this morning, moving to the Russian camp three miles east of the city, which is now practically unprotected.

A FAIR BASIS OF PEACE. NEW YORK, May 14.—(Special)—A Berlin correspondent of The Times says he learns on excellent authority of the possibility of peace on the basis of the independence of Korea under protection of Japan and Manchuria to remain Chinese territory.

CHINO-JAPANESE SECRET TREATY. In a secret treaty between China and Japan the integrity of Manchuria has been guaranteed by Japan.

SKRYDLOFF MOVES SLOWLY. IRKUTSK, SIBERIA, May 14.—(Special)—Admiral Skrydloff passed through here today on his way to the front.

[The report via Paris of the capture of Port Arthur is absurdly premature, as there is no certainty that any Japanese troops are within twenty miles of that place. Most of the Japanese troops so far landed on the Liao Tung peninsula appear to have gone northward. Content for the present with having isolated Port Arthur, the Japanese plan is apparently to next inflict a crushing defeat upon Kuropatkin's main army before undertaking the siege of the Russian naval stronghold. Kuroki's army appears to have divided, and to be moving on New Chwang and Liao Yang respectively, while another Japanese force further east and of unknown strength is moving toward the Russ left flank at Mukden, or between that point and Liao Yang. We regard the report of a secret treaty between China and Japan as probable with the terms substantially as stated. As to the Times' Berlin correspondent's story of Russia's willingness to make peace with Manchuria to remain a Chinese province, the story may be true if coupled with the continuance of Russia's long lease of Port Arthur, Dalny and her railway privileges.]
