

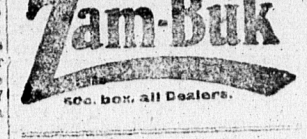

WIFE OF MONCTON MAN KILLED IN A CYCLE ACCIDENT

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 9—A romance of the past was a pathetic ending today when a cablegram was received from Galtford, Surrey (Eng.) by William Phippey of this city, announcing that his young wife, for whom he was establishing a home here, had been terribly injured in a motor cycle accident in the old country and had died soon afterwards.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10—A German war plot that failed was revealed here today. Four defective bolts, taken from the machinery of the United States transport Mount Vernon told the tale.

The skillfully made cuts remained hidden by the fittings of the engines and were only discovered recently when the engines were taken apart.

It was nearly dark by the bank to close. I would run in and see if he could possibly have gone all the way there alone.

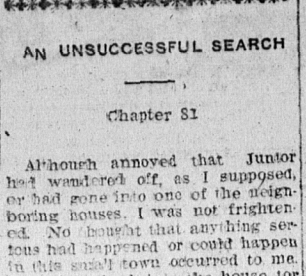
"What is it, Nan?" Dick asked when I went in. "Has anything happened?"

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NEWFOUNDLAND FIGHTING WORST SNOWSTORM IN THIRTY YEARS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 10—Newfoundland today began its fight to beat back the worst snow storm in 30 years, with monumental drifts blocking its gates after a four-day blizzard. Railroad, steam and highway transportation still was suspended tonight, although the storm had ceased. The first snow from this city against the besieging elements was made by a Whippet tank captured by Newfoundlanders in the war, which was put to work crunching down snow-banks on Water Street the city's main thoroughfare.

Leo McDonald age 51 of 1 Langdon sq., well-known in this city, where he has been a prominent master painter for many years, died at his home Dec 27th, death being caused by a shock to a very few days ago. Mr. McDonald had been in the best of health. Mr. McDonald was born in Souris, Prince Edward Island, but had been a resident of this city for the past 35 years.

He is survived by his wife and four children. Funeral services were held at St. Peter's church, the church was filled with relatives and friends including delegations from the many fraternal organizations of which he had membership.
