There will be forty voices in the choruses, all the songs and jokes of which there are many, are brand new. Thursday evening, June 14th is the date and tickets in reserve for it and let no other engagement prevent attendance. IN MEMORIAM  
MRS. HERMAN JONES  
At Pownal, on May 16th, after an illness of over two weeks, there entered into rest, Ellen B., beloved wife of Herman Jones, aged 39. Interment was at Hazelbrook Cemetery of which church she was a member. Besides her husband, she leaves four bright boys to miss her tender, loving care.  
Mrs. Jones was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Drake, West River, by whom she is survived and also by four sisters and two brothers. MR. CHESTER F. VAN IDERSTINE  
Many friends in Charlottetown were pained to learn of the death at his home in this city on Saturday evening, of Mr. Chester F. Van Iderstine, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cephas Van Iderstine, Orlebar Street. Deceased was for some years a very efficient clerk in the Royal Bank in this city afterwards joined the staff of the Canadian Bank of Commerce being transferred to the branch at Amherst. He remained there but a few months when he was transferred to Western Canada. Here his health broke down and last January he returned home in the hope that he would be restored by his native air. This unfortunately did not prove to be the case and he gradually grew weaker, until the end came on Saturday evening at 7 o'clock. Deceased was a very bright and popular young man, an efficient and courteous clerk and his demise at the early age of 25 is indeed regrettable. He took an active interest in athletics and as goal tender for the Abegweit Hockey team of several years ago was regarded as without a peer in this Province. He was also an esteemed member of the I.O.O.F. Subordinate and Encampment and Rebekah Lodges; also a member of the A.F. and A.M., Victoria Lodges and of Alexandra Chapter and also belonged to the L.O.A. He is survived by his parents and three brothers, Waldron, who left here with the 98th Siege Battery and is at present in a hospital in London, after being at the front for several months; Beverly and Frank at home. To the bereaved the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

WITH THE AMERICANS.

Sir.—The coal mine operators of the United States have held a meeting with the Federal Trade Board of the United States; and they have promised plenty of all kinds of coal for everybody. It is expected that a hundred million tons more of coal will be produced this year than was mined during 1916. Customers must not "Bull the Market," by buying advance supplies.
