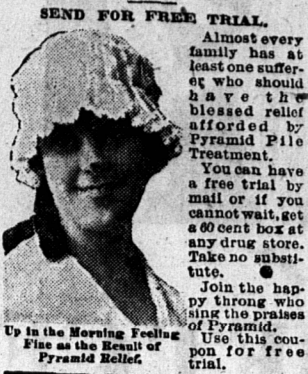

**Vast Increase in
P.E.I. Freight Traffic**

In conversation with Superintendent
Grady of the P. E. I. R., a Guardian
representative was informed that the
Car ferry steamer from October 1st to
November 21st—a period of 48 days,
had made 288 trips, an average of
three round trips per day. The total
number of broad gauge cars ferried
was 2865, an average of 59 cars per
day.

During this period there were 1677
standard cars received and 1188 cars
forwarded.

On the third rail district there were
1297 standard cars handled of which
738 were received and 559 forwarded
to the mainland.

From the narrow gauge district,
east of Charlottetown and west of
Summerside, there were 1440 island
cars forwarded to Borden to be trans-
ferred into standard cars for main-
land points, an average of 30 cars
per day; and forwarded to the narrow
gauge district from standard cars at
Borden via Island cars 378.

In the various freight commodities
moved during the period there were
475,000 bushels potatoes, 170,000 bush-
els oats and 180 tons starch.

During the month of October special
efforts were made towards the
movement of potatoes and other per-
ishable freight, leaving oats and hay
to be moved later, and which are
now being moved at the rate of about
1000 cars per day. This movement
at the present time is especially
heavy from the district west of Sum-
merside.

It was learned that the freight
handled during the above named 48
days is almost equal in tonnage to
that moved during the months of Octo-
ber, November and December of
last year.

With reference to the earnings, we
find great strides have been made.

In the year 1880 the total revenue
of the P.E.I. Railway was \$113,851.11
and not until 1903 did the revenue
reach the three hundred thousand dol-
lar mark. In 1904 the four hundred
thousand mark was reached and in
1916 it had fallen back to \$390,
000, owing to war conditions, since
which time the revenue has been in
creasing rapidly.

The year 1917 showed a revenue of
\$445,000, 1918 showed a revenue of
\$478,000, 1919 of \$741,000.
For the period of the present year
1919-20 which closes on the 31st
March next the earnings for the past
seven and a half months have reached
the figure of \$629,000, being an in-
crease of 28 per cent. over the same

period of last year and at the same
ratio of increase up to the end of the
year it is probably that the revenue
will reach the million dollar mark.

There are 500 regular employees
whose annual wages amount to \$1,
000,000. Last year there were 300
temporarily employees and the total
wages bill was \$1,750,000. On the
terminals at Fortin and Borden
there were spent the last four years
almost \$3,000,000; all charged to the
capital account of the P. E. I. R.

From the president down all the
staff are anxious to do the best for
Prince Edward Island. Early
next spring the standardization of
the road west of Summerside will
be started. This will give 140 miles of
standardized road.

During the last two years the road
bed of the railway has been immen-
sely improved, half a million ties hav-
ing been laid down. This was some-
thing which was greatly needed.

There were also about twenty new
bridges built to replace old ones and
about sixty miles of new steel rail
laid.

The same difficulty which of late has
confronted all other industrial con-
cerns has affected the railway—the
difficulty of securing labor and mater-
ial for the work.
