present at the opening of the case, and they were not to blame for the delay as conditions were such that the presiding judge was unable to proceed with the case and was forced to adjourn it owing to illness while Mr. McDonald was on the stand. It must be understood that neither Mr. McDonald nor Mr. Morley were witnesses under the control of the court, and it rested with them to be here or not as they saw fit. Circumstances have arisen which necessitates their absence and so far as the court is concerned an adjournment is necessary. It would be an outrage if any other point of view were taken in the circumstances. It is quite sufficient that the affidavit of the counsel for defense shows that they are unable to proceed without the missing witnesses. The only question now is what time the court can best adjourn the case, if the witnesses could not be gotten here at a certain date then their evidence could be taken by commission. The adjournment might be made until April 11th as this would probably be the most convenient date.

The Chief Justice proposed that the hearing of special papers be proceeded with for the present week. There are some twenty-two cases on the docket, comprising applications for certiorari and appeal, a number of which will probably be quite lengthy. It is unnecessary to clear off at the present time this docket which is now overloaded with delayed cases, always bearing in mind of course the convenience of the counsel engaged. Next week the court might be adjourned to be re-opened for the special docket on the 20th and continued until the date April 11th when the present case can be reopened.

Attorney General Johnston pleaded the necessity of his attendance at the Legislature which opens the 14th of this month and asked if a further adjournment of the docket cases could not be made.

The Chief Justice said that in postponing the cases over next week the court was recognizing the demands of counsel for further time as far as possible. As to counsel who are members of the Legislature it must remain for them to arrange in which capacity they wish to serve during the period when both sessions may be under way. The court cannot consider in the present crowded state of the docket, that counsel may also be members of parliament, if they have taken upon themselves twofold duties they may perhaps get sympathy but they cannot get further consideration at this particular term. Last fall when a number

of cases came on at the November term the court did give consideration to the fact that counsel were engaged in an important election and for that reason it was agreed that the cases should stand over when the special cases will be called and the delay in regard to a number of cases has been so long an application was heard before the Chief Justice and associate judges clearing off of all the arrears can meet requirements. After some further discussion by the Magistrate for an offence against the Prohibition Act, Inman, K. C., for applicant, Bentley, K. C., for the Prohibition Inspector. Judgment was reserved. There are other prohibition cases which will be taken up in order. The court adjourned until 11 o'clock this morning.
