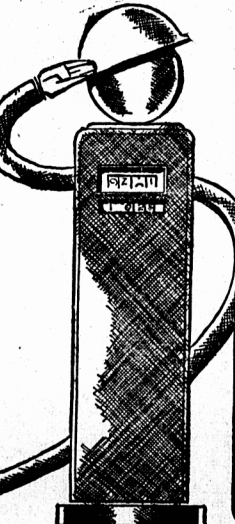


Every day 400,000 gallons GO INTO THIN AIR!
