**Queen's Canadian Fund News**

Prince Edward Island Gives \$5,418 To The Queen's Canadian Fund

Women's Institutes and "Carry On Canada" Corps Are Chief Supporters

The Queen's Canadian Fund has received \$5,418 from subscribers in Prince Edward Island. The Fund has been promoted by the Charlottetown Patriot and the Summerside Journal, the Royal Trust, Charlottetown, being the collecting agency.

Principal supporters of the Fund have been the Women's Institutes and the Carry On Canada Corps. From 103 Women's Institute subscriptions a total of \$840 has been raised, while the Carry On Canada Corps has contributed \$552. In addition, under the auspices of the Corps and with its co-operation, the Women's Institute of Bristol and Moral made \$1,018 in a two-day entertainment. This sum was earmarked for the relief of raid victims in Bristol, England.

Many and various methods of raising money have been adopted with success, including tea sales, piano recitals and garden parties. One party given by the Charlottetown Guilders, was held in the grounds of Government House, by permission of the Lieutenant-Governor, W. B. LePage, bringing in \$90.

Other outstanding contributions have included \$80 from the R.C.N.V.R., Charlottetown, \$75 from the I.O.D.E., Abegweit Chapter, Summerside, and \$50 from the Grand Orange Lodge of the L. O. B. A. The Directors of the Queen's Canadian Fund are gratified with such support from the smallest Province—where there has been little additional money from war payrolls, and where the population have subscribed generously to war loans and war savings from none too splendid earnings from their farms and fisheries.

The Queen's Canadian Fund operates in all parts of the United Kingdom through the Lord Mayor's National Air Raid Distress Fund.

**Father O'Neill Gives Lecture on Western Canada**

Tells How European Races Are Becoming Good Canadians.

"In Western Canada all the races of Europe live in peace and accord. They have brought their traditions and their culture and are working to build homes for themselves and their children. The European is coming to be a good Canadian." Rev. Richard O'Neill of Viking, Alberta, made this statement at a meeting of the Charlottetown Council of the Knights of Columbus held last evening. Grand Knight J. Alfred Doyle presided.

Father O'Neill, a former Charlottetown resident, has been in Alberta eighteen years, having been sent West after his ordination following graduation from St. Dunstan's University. In the West, he related in his lecture last evening, he has met and lived with nationals from many of the countries of Europe. His lecture was filled with anecdotes and personal reminiscences of his stay in Alberta.

The Czech-Slovakians received high praise from Father O'Neill. In his opinion they represent the best of the European races. He spoke of many great Czech personalities he had met, including the brother of Edward Benes, the Premier of the Czech-Slovakian government in exile. "This race," stated Father O'Neill, "have felt the tread of conquering armies, but they have never bowed to a victor and to this day they remain a calm and united people."

The lecturer told of the Ukrainians—definitely Mongol in type, the Rumanians, the Poles, the Rutenians, the Yugoslavs and the Serbs. All of these are of Slavic origin, although certain peoples are

"The first aim of the railways in these times is to assist in winning the war and everything in connection with railway operation is devoted to that end," Mr. F. R. Sawyer, Public Relations representative of the C. N. R. said in an interview last night.

"The railways are playing a major part in Canada's war effort," being the foundation of Canada's transport structure," he added. "As Canada's war production gets into higher gear the railways will be called upon to play a greater part and their facilities will be utilized to an ever increasing extent to transport the growing output of war munitions and supplies and also members of the armed forces. With this in mind railway officials feel that the time is fast approaching, if it is not already at hand, when the travelling public will have to suffer some curtailment in some of the services that are now being operated and have been built up

**Blood Donors' Club holds Annual meeting**

The members of the Blood Donors' Club of the Charlottetown Hospital were addressed by Honorable Doctor W. J. P. McMillan at their Annual Meeting. In his opening remarks the Doctor commended the members for the noble and charitable work they were doing in giving their life's blood for the preservation of other lives. He outlined the progress made in medicine and surgery, and in hospitals particularly, pointing out that a comparatively few years ago x-rays, blood studies and laboratory examinations were almost unknown. The Charlottetown Hospital has ever been in the vanguard in progressing the best. The addition of equipment is an electrocardiograph.

In dealing with the main topic of his address, Group Hospitalization and Co-operative Medicine, Doctor McMillan stressed how very necessary it is for people to understand these questions now being brought before legislators across the Dominion. The burdens of sickness make it imperative that something should be done to aid the moderate and low income groups, but it is important that the best possible solution be applied to this social problem. The plight of the rural districts is in most cases serious—doctors are so few and far between.
