THE PERSISTENCE OF TYPE

As it Has Been Illustrated by Railway Carriages and Motor Cars.

The earlier railway carriages were, with the most slavish exactness, built on the pattern of the old stage coaches that preceded them. Every carriage was simply three coaches stuck together and carried on an iron frame, which ran upon four wheels. Even the coachman's seat was reproduced in grotesque miniature; and each of these carriages, consisting of

three compartments, had the legend inscribed on it, "Tria juncta in uno." It took half a century in this country to introduce a new style of carriage, and, even now, though certain details of the old stage coach have disappeared, the stage coach pattern is still the one that prevails, though with a growing number of exceptions, both here and throughout Europe. A still more remarkable example of the same persistence of a type and the same inability of the human imagination to change it is afforded us by the motor car. Nothing impedes the popularity of the

motor car so much as the fact that its appearance is to our eyes awkward and even ridiculous. Constant efforts are being made to overcome this defect, but hitherto they have been made in vain. The reason is simply this: that the human imagination is altogether dominated by the old idea of a carriage drawn by horses; and no one has hitherto been able to design a car which does not suggest a carriage from which the horses have been taken out. There is consequently in the whole structure a want of balance and meaning; and a motor car in motion,

with its driver in a peaked cap, gives the impression that while the carriage is being driven the horses are some distance in disguise of a mechanic had got into the box, and was making the vehicle go. The result can be obtained only by the introduction of some design which is original; but, though the human imagination can multiply ideas, it has hitherto proved unable to do so with a new pattern for a motor car. (London Saturday Review.)
