CHILDREN'S Home—A meeting of citizens
 in favor of establishing a home to care for
 and educate uncared for children in this
 city, will be held on Wednesday afternoon
 at 4 o'clock in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor. A
 special appeal is made in this case to our
 people—Clergymen, Lawyers, Merchants
 and Citizens generally to attend this
 very important meeting. Meeting

FOR some years past it has been the
 custom of the various societies in
 connection with St. Peter's Cathedral to
 hold an anniversary meeting for the
 election of officers and other business
 during the week following All Saints Day.
 A social is also held, at which all mem-
 bers of the congregation over fourteen
 years of age meet for social intercourse
 and amusement. Last night the
 gathering was large and the social in
 every way one of the most successful in
 the history of the church.

A meeting of the Board of Health was
 held last night to decide upon an
 emergency hospital for smallpox. After
 discussion the Mayor was empowered to
 make arrangements for a building at
 once. His Worship was also instructed to
 write to Dr. Conroy requesting him to
 inspect inward vessels from infected
 ports. It is understood that it will be
 necessary for Dr. Conroy to receive
 instructions from the Department of
 Agriculture as at present his duties are
 restricted to vessels arriving from foreign
 ports.

Mr. Horsey's address in the church
 Upper Great George St., was well
 attended by an audience that evidently
 came to hear, and he presented from
 Isaiah 48: 16, Matt. 28: 19, Acts 8:26
 and other passages the truth of the Holy
 Trinity. Then from many other passages
 the work of the Holy Spirit in producing
 new birth, and indwelling all true
 believers. He is to continue his subject
 on Thursday on the baptism of the
 Holy Spirit, and tonight Mr. Greenman is
 to speak on "The Only Way to God." A
 welcome is extended to all and the
 meetings are free, so no one need be hinder-
 ed from coming.

THERE was a large attendance at the
 market yesterday. Oats are in good
 demand and in some cases as high as 38c.
 was paid. The demand for oats is certain-
 ly strong, caused doubtless by the purchase
 made by the Imperial Government in
 Ontario. There is more enquiry for pota-
 toes from abroad. One dealer was paying
 23 to 25 cents while another stated yester-
 day evening that he paid during the day
 22 cents for the red variety and 24 cents
 for blues. Hay is worth \$10 per ton for
 the pressed; wheat is in good demand at
 65 cents with very little coming in. The
 price paid for turnips was eleven cents.
 There was a liberal supply of fowl on the
 market but owing to the season being
 early the price was not high.

A CORRESPONDENT at Cape Traverse
 writes that unusual bad conduct was dis-
 played round and about the neighborhood
 Hollow'en. One respectable citizen in
 the quiet village on visiting his stable
 next morning was (shockingly) surprised
 to find that his young horse had been
 stolen by some malicious character or
 characters, also one of the bike wheels
 belonging to his bike sulkey. Great
 excitement prevailed for a time. At last
 the proud owner who is somewhat of a
 detective, found his valuable
 mare whose dam has a
 mark of 2:38 and sire 2:24 in a neighbor's
 barn. The case, we understand, will be
 settled out of Court, the villain paying
 all expenses, and replacing bike wheel.

PRINCE Street school teachers and
 pupils have by efforts put forth in pre-
 vious years succeeded in starting a good
 library for the use of the school. To add
 to their collection of books they purpos-
 ed this year holding a school exhibit in the
 Y. M. C. A. Hall on Thursday the 28th inst
 Thanksgiving Day, afternoon and evening.
 Besides being a means of adding to the
 library fund of the school, it will give an
 opportunity to the general public to
 examine some of the work done by the
 pupils.

The validity of the Prohibition Act
 passed by the Legislature of this Province
 in the session of 1900 came up yesterday
 before the Supreme Court for argument.
 Three Judges are presiding and the local
 Government which is upholding the Act
 is represented by Attorney General Peters
 Mr. H. J. Palmer and Mr. J. F. Wheat,
 while the liquor interests are represented
 by Mr. W. S. Stewart, K. C. The case
 comes before the Court on the return of a
 rule nisi granted during vacation to show
 cause why the convictions which have
 been made by Stipendiary Magistrate
 McDonald since the Act came into force in
 the month of June last, should not be set
 aside and quashed, on the ground that
 the Act is ultra vires, or beyond the
 power of the Provincial Legislature to
 enact. The Attorney General and Mr.
 Palmer were arguing all day yesterday
 in support of the power of the Provincial
 Legislature to pass the Act in
 question and cited numerous
 authorities and decisions in support of
 their view of the case. The respective
 legislative powers of the Dominion Parli-
 ament and Local Legislature arise in this
 case and there has been so far no express
 decision that the Local Legislature have
 the power to pass a prohibitory
 liquor law. The Manitoba Act, which is
 very similar to ours is now before the
 Privy Council for determination and the
 decision in that case, which is expected
 soon, will undoubtedly settle the rights of
 the Provinces with regard to Prohibitory
 legislation.

Mr. Wheat will follow Mr. Palmer this
 morning on the same side, after which
 Mr. Stewart will reply. The argument
 will last all of today and probably a part
 of tomorrow. Considerable interest is
 being taken in the case.
