AROUND THE FUR RANCHES

Saturday's Royal Gazette contains the notices of application for letters patent for the incorporation of more new fox companies, viz., 'Ellerslie Silver Black Foxes, Limited,' with a capital of \$50,000, divided into \$10 shares, and its head office to be in Ellerslie; 'Kinsman Silver Black and Patch Fox Co., Ltd.,' with a capital of \$50,000, divided into shares of the value of \$25 each, and with its head office to be located in Charlottetown; 'Hazel Grove Black and Silver Fox Co., Ltd.,' with a capital stock of \$30,000, divided into fifty-dollar shares, and with its principal place of business in Charlottetown; 'Lot Twelve Fox Co., Ltd.,' with a capital of \$60,000, divided into shares of \$10 each, and its head office to be situated in Biddeford; 'Inkerman Fur Farms, Ltd.,' with a capital of \$220,000, divided into hundred-dollar shares, and with its principal place of business to be in Charlottetown.

That outside capitalists are getting more and more fully alive to the profitable possibilities of the black fox industry was made abundantly evident within the last few days when, as already intimated, in these columns, several parties of influential investors from the States and the Canadian mainland visited the Island for the purpose of conducting personal investigation of the business with a view to engaging in it, and in fact ended by promptly investing heavily in the industry. Among these parties was one, not already referred to, which visited the Royal Investment Exchange. It consisted of several capitalists from New York, Boston and New Brunswick. As the result of their investigation, which included interviews with Mr. McCready and other prominent men, they became financially interested. They were taken out to see the Provincial Company's ranch and were greatly interested and much pleased with the excellent manner in which that ranch is conducted. In the evening the visitors were entertained to a spin around the harbor in the motor-boat 'Vincoco.'

The 'Delaney-Smith Silver Black Foxes, Limited' are applying to the Lieut. Governor-in-Council for supplementary letters patent to enable them to increase their capital stock from \$85,000, divided into 1,300 fifty-dollar shares, to \$195,000, divided into shares of the same value.

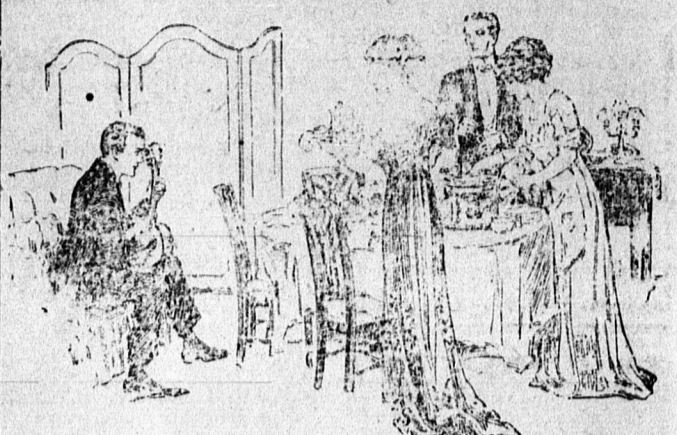
