THE LATE JUDGE ALLEY.

The death of Judge Alley, occurred shortly before The GUARDIAN went to press yesterday morning and to the very brief notice then given something may be added. The deceased Judge had held the foremost position among the County Court Judges of this Province for almost a quarter of a century. In the volume of business, the number and importance of the causes to be tried, the business of the County Court of Queens stands first, and for these reasons the salary attached to the position was made greater than in the other counties.

Judge Alley brought to the discharge of his judicial duties a well-stored and well trained legal mind. He was eminently just and impartial, and in that regard held the entire confidence of the bar, the litigants who came before him and the entire public. But what was almost equally important, he was most painstaking in regard to every cause that came before him, whether of small or great importance, and as a result his judgements came to be accepted in most cases as final. In the few cases in which appeals from his decisions were carried up to the superior court his judgements were almost invariably sustained.

The high qualities to which we have adverted made the late Judge eminently adapted to the position which he so worthily filled. His demise, while yet in the prime of a judicial career is a grave public loss which must long be felt. He was appointed to the judgeship at a remarkably early age, and for that reason the soundness which characterized his decisions from first to last was the more noteworthy. He has left us at an age younger than some men are appointed to the bench and yet he had lived to serve for what was comparatively a long judicial term.

The commendation that has been extended by all to judge Alley in his judicial career may be extended to other phases of his life. He was a good citizen, with a deep interest in the welfare and advancement of the city, the province, the Dominion and the Empire. He took much pains to acquire material for a history of P. E. Island which he hoped to write. Had he been permitted to do so the work would have been undoubtedly of great value. It is another feature of the public loss that he was removed before this cherished object could be carried out. He was loving, kind and solicitous in his family relations, and a sincere and devoted friend to those who knew him intimately.

The sympathy of the entire community, in which THE GUARDIAN sincerely joins, goes out to the bereaved relatives.

IMPORTANT INSURANCE DECISION.

One Emil Greef, insured on the endowment plan in the Equitable Life Insurance Company of New York. His policy was to run for a term of fifteen years, at the end of which time a stated endowment with profits was to be paid him. The policy matured in 1897, and not satisfied with the profits allotted him Greef sued the company. Judge Woodward, of the Appellate Division has rendered judgment, which, if sustained by the full court, will have most important, in fact almost revolutionary results.

Hitherto such portion of the profits of certain companies as the directors chose to set aside was allotted to policy holders, or at least the directors were allowed a very large discretion, and enormous surpluses were rolled up. Judge Woodward takes the ground that directors of life insurance companies have no right to use discretion in dealing with a company's surplus, and that they cannot legally set aside only a portion of their income as a basis upon which the earnings of policies shall be estimated. He says such earnings must be based upon the total surplus of the company.

Should this decision hold good it will make a material gain for those insured in New York mutual companies. The "three giants" as the three largest New York companies are sometimes called, have an aggregate of surpluses amounting to \$139,

000,000. While individual policy holders would stand to gain by the decision being confirmed their number is also very great, to that no one, unless insured for a large amount would very greatly increase the returns from his policy.

Arbor Day in the schools is again near at hand, and we trust it may be effectually celebrated. We are satisfied that some good work has been accomplished by setting apart a day for this purpose and that much more may be done in the future if care and thoroughness are exercised in the day's doings. Very slim results have followed the Arbor Day plantings in Quebec if the Montreal Star tells truly, but this city is not in Quebec. The Star says, with mild sarcasm: "Arbor Day, it may as well be admitted, is a pronounced failure. There is no fault to be found with the founders of the institution in this province. It was a charming, poetic, old world eighteenth century idea; but it has never taken root; perhaps it was planted upside down. We have had Arbor Day now for fifteen years and feel safe in saying that there are fewer trees in the Province to-day than fifteen years ago. Arbor day does no particular harm except in so far as we may rely upon it instead of something more effectual. For all practical purposes it is as useless as a Minister without portfolio."
