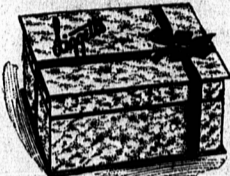

THE PIGTOU BOAT.—The s.s. Northumberland docked at Charlottetown last evening at 6.25 o'clock.

HOME GUARDS.—No. 3 Company Home Guard will meet for drill this evening at 8 o'clock.

FULL MAIL.—Yesterday the trains on the mainland made connections and the Express train brought to Charlottetown a full mail last night.

ARTILLERY AT FUNERAL.—At the funeral of Mayor Angus Stewart, of Sydney Mines, yesterday afternoon, the P.E.I. Heavy Artillery now stationed there took part in the funeral procession.

WINS PIANO.—The Guardian is pleased to announce that Mr. T. M. Linkletter, of Summerside, is the winner of the "Patriotic Fund" Piano donated by Mr. Allan Forsyth, city, on behalf of Miller Bros. Mr. Linkletter's tender was \$226.

NEW K. OF C. HOME.—The new home of the Knights of Columbus, Charlottetown, on the corner of Kent and Pownall Streets is now being remodelled in excellent style and got ready for occupation. Men are working steadily and expect to have the building ready by the first of the year.

LOADING OATS FOR THE FRONT.—The s.s. Morwenna (Capt. Holmes), of the Black Diamond Line arrived at Charlottetown yesterday at 11 a. m., after a record trip from St. John's, Nfld., of forty-four hours. She is now at the Marine Wharf loading Army Field Service oats. There is already in the city a full cargo of 80,000 bushels of oats. It is expected the loading will be completed to-night, the loading being continued all night, and she will leave for her destination, Le Havre, France, to-morrow morning. The oats and freight represent a value of \$55,000.

MARITIME FORWARD MOVEMENT.—At Amherst on Thursday, December 17, there will be held a conference of those who are interested in the Maritime Forward Movement. The General Executive is composed of Messrs. A. H. Wetmore, St. John, N.B.; George Henderson, Halifax, N.S.; E. T. Higgs, Bruce Stewart, Charlottetown, P.E.I.; Capt. J. O. Read, Summerside, P.E.I.; H. G. Grant, New Glasgow; Thomas Williams, Moncton, N.B.; G. W. Montgomery, Truro, N.S. The purpose of this movement is to discover to the people of the Maritime Provinces their own resources and to give them a greater confidence in them. It is hoped that the meeting will result in advertising the resources of the provinces and bring them to the attention of the outside world. Among those who are invited to take part in this meeting are the Premier, Hon. J. A. Mathieson, and the Commissioner of Agriculture, Hon. Murdoch McKinnon.

ISLANDERS LEAD AGAIN.—Prince Edward Island exhibitors will appear very prominently in the full prize list of the Amherst Winter Fair, when it is published. Messrs. J. W. Calbeck, Summerside; Alex. Stewart, of Marshfield, and Peter Brodie, of York, each captured a cup in the swine class. Mr. S. J. Vessey captured the Ewing Cup for the second time for best exhibit of seed grain. Mr. Richard Creed, of Aldion, took the trophy for best collection of grain; Messrs. McRae & Son are winners in Ayrshire; Messrs. Lea & Clark, Victoria; Mr. J. L. Leach, of Kensington, took a number of prizes for herds, while the Messrs. Boswell and Cephas Munn as usual practically cleared up all that was to be won in sheep. Mr. L. H. D. Foster captured six firsts, two seconds and one sixth out of 11 entries of Plymouth Rocks and also took six prizes for dressed poultry and a number of prizes for grain.

LONG COURSE.—The Agricultural Hall is quite a busy place now, for besides the activity attending the buying of horses for the British Army, the students of the Long Course are learning to make apple barrels, and every afternoon boys can be seen selecting staves, putting up barrels, firing and getting them into shape. This work is being carried on under the direction of Mr. A. E. Dewar. On Wednesday three barrels were made, yesterday twenty, and if the number increases in the same proportion fruit-growers will no longer have any trouble in securing plenty of apple barrels in which to pack their fruit. It was expected that quite a number of fruit-growers would take advantage of this course, as there is plenty of opportunity in the winter to put together barrels. Up to the present no one has done so. The Department of Agriculture is prepared to give assistance in this matter by paying the railway fares of all those who attend and show evidence of having taken up the work with earnestness.

IMPORTANT MEETINGS.—Several important meetings are to be held next Wednesday in Summerside. At 10 o'clock in the morning there will be a meeting of the Provincial Seed Fair Committee to complete arrangements for the Provincial Fair. This Committee is nominated by the Central Farmers' Institute, and this year by resolution Rev. Dr. Gauthier was appointed to select them. In the afternoon, at one o'clock, a meeting of the Banner Oat Club will be held. All those who entered banner oats in the standing fields of grain competition and who secured not less than 19 1/2 points out of 20 for purity may become members of this club. In the past two years the club has sold oats for its members at an increase of from 10 cents a bushel up over prices obtained for feed oats, and there is every prospect of good sales this year, as seed oats are wanted not only in Western Canada, but also in some of the countries of Europe. At 3 o'clock the formal opening of the Poultry Exhibition will take place. Arrangements have been made for single fare return tickets, and it is expected the Summerside will be a busy place on Wednesday next.

ATTENDING PEACE CELEBRATION.—Mr. and Mrs. T. C. James left yesterday morning, by invitation, to attend the celebration of the 100 years of peace, which is to be held in New Orleans on the 8th, 9th and 10th of January. Notwithstanding the fact that the celebration is to be a commemoration of the active work of the Orleans, one of the most decisive defeats ever sustained by the British, quite a large number of Canadians have been invited and doubtless the emphasis of the celebration will be laid on the 100 years that have elapsed since the historic battle. Their many friends will wish Mr. and Mrs. James a pleasant visit.

REV. W. J. KIRBY RETIRES.—The Rev. W. J. Kirby, pastor of the Point de Bute Methodist church, proposes to retire from the active work of the ministry at the end of the ecclesiastical year, and, as a preliminary step has purchased the house in the above village built thirty or forty years ago by the late Mr. Albert Carter, and subsequently occupied by the late Mr. Martin Trueman. With the exception of Dr. Chapman, of Amherst, Mr. Kirby is the only Methodist clergyman who has so far adopted Point de Bute as a locality for super-numerary residence. And yet the fact that it is the oldest Methodist church in the Dominion, must do much to recommend it as a home for a Methodist preacher. Mr. Kirby might do worse than spend some of his leisure hours in the restful years to come in the composition of a history of Methodism in Westmoreland at large. The sources of the required historical knowledge are slowly but surely passing away, and the man who rescues them from oblivion is a public benefactor of the best type.—Mr. Kirby was at one time pastor of Grace Church, Charlottetown.

TWO MILLION JEWS HAVE BEEN DRIVEN FROM HOME IN POLAND.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Approximate-

ly two million Jews have been driven from their homes in Russian Poland, according to a cablegram from the Petrograd office of the Jewish Colonization association, made public here today by the American Jewish Relief committee. The message, in part, reads as follows:

"The Jews of all Russian Poland, and the greater part of the Jews in the provinces of Kovno, Vilna, Grodno, Volynia, Podolia, and Bessarabia are suffering. The number of refugees and destitute approximates two millions. Extreme distress also prevails among the Jews in the Galician provinces occupied by the Russian armies."

GERMAN EMPEROR'S NERVE CAN'T SAVE HIM.

BERLIN, Dec. 10.—There is published here to-day a speech made on December 3rd, by Emperor William at one of the army camps composed of Germans and Austrians, which he visited on his recent trip to the Eastern front.

"You are fighting for a just cause, for liberty, for the right to exist as a nation, and for a future of prolonged peace," said the emperor. "We

shall continue to fight with a success as heretofore, for heaven is on our side. With God we shall achieve a prolonged peace, for our nerves are stronger than those of our enemy."

GERMAN AMMUNITION IS BECOMING SCARCE.

PARIS, Dec. 10.—According to the Temps, a German document has been found in a village in the department of the Aisne, recommending that economy be observed in the use of projectiles for the artillery. The reason for this recommendation, it is said, is that the German ammunition factories, even when working at full force, are unable to supply indefinite amounts of ammunition for the army.
