Giants Trounce Dodgers 17-3 As Yankees Look On; Extend Lead To Five Games

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—Maybe it was because their prospective world's series opponents were in the stands, or perhaps they were remembering 1934. Anyway, the New York Giants pulled up closer to the National League pennant at Brooklyn today by unscoring their heaviest hitting attack of the season to trample their one-time jinx, the Brooklyn Dodgers, 17-3.

While several members of the American League championship team, the Yankees, took a "business holiday" and watched the game, the Giants walloped five Dodgers' pitchers for 23 hits and their biggest run-making and base hitting spree of the year.

The victory, with Gabbo Gabler catching seven-hit ball and Hank Lauer providing a homer with the bases loaded, pulled the Giants

Looking Over U. S. Amateur Semi-finalists

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—Close-ups of the four men who lasted to become semi-finalists in the 40th United States amateur golf championship:

John Goodman—The ex-caddy from Omaha who beat all the big shots pros out for the United States open championship of 1933 with the doggedest putting spree in the open's history.

Banging at the door for amateur honors for years and beaten by Canada's Sandy Somerville for this title in 1932 he's the man to beat now, say the experts. His one fault was a terrific hook. Now he actually fades his irons to the green.

Jack McLean—Jack is a strict teetotaler but he sells whiskey for a living. The quiet Scot is only 26 but an old fashioned fellow when it comes to riding golf balls. His back swing is short but he has a tremendous follow through that usually winds up cracking his heel. Very compact with his irons and a daring putter. Very short off the tee. Hooks almost every shot but seems to be getting away with it at the hookless paradise of Garden City. Raps his putts so hard you can hear the crack yards away. An English journalist says Jack knows only one thing about the liquor business: That sherry is served in a small glass and that whiskey (at the right party) is served in a big glass.

Johnny Fischer—The best he's been able to do in the national amateur before this week was to reach the quarter-finals although for years the 24-year-old string bean from Cincinnati has been one of the world's best amateurs, winning the amateur medal twice when qualifying rounds were held. He's the longest hitter off the tees among the survivors. Uses the wide open stance. He hits his wood shots slightly off the left foot, as the better pros do, but reverses his position on his long irons.

George Voigt—George, a sad-looking boy, is around his dangerous 40's. He's been banging at the door for years. Disgusted with the new-fangled clubs, George went back to his old "bats" this year and has been hotter than hot. His clubs look like they came over in the ark, black and rusty. George isn't long off the tees but he's straighter than a tight laced preacher.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 17.—A new Maritime record of 2:08 3-4 for three year olds was established today on the fastest half mile track in Canada as Volrida, bay mare owned by Sullivan and Mawhinney, Machias, Me., and driven by Henry Clukey, showed her heels to the fastest field of three-year-olds ever to race at the Fredericton Exhibition meet.

The packed grandstand echoed with applause as the sleek little mare streaked under the wire three lengths in front of Sully in the first heat to break the record of 2:11 set by J. D. Direct here in 1930. Clukey reined his mare in easily in 2:09 1-4 and 2:10 to win the next two and first money.

Heatherbell bay gelding owned by Lt. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, of Charlottetown, and driven by his owner, romped home in three straight heats to win the free-for-all trot from Lusty Frisco, chestnut Harvester and Morning Express in 2:09.

Marcel Rainville has been a member of Canada's team in the International Davis Cup contests since 1929. From 1929 to 1934 he was twice ranked the Dominion's No. 1 court master and three times No. 2.

In 1935 he was the mainstay of the four players sent to meet the English champions Fred Perry and Bunny Austin at Wimbledon.

Jock McLean Strong Threat For U. S. Title

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., Sept. 17.—Two youthful American Walker Cup stars, a 42-year-old metropolitan veteran making a brilliant comeback, and a shotmaking son of Scotland emerged today as the semi-finalists in the bunkered battle for the United States amateur golf championship.

Tomorrow, over the 36-hole route on the Garden City golf club's historically formidable links Omaha's Chunky Johnny Goodman and Cincinnati's Willow Johnny Fischer collide for the first time, in the upper half, while Scotland's 25-year-old Jock McLean tackles the seasoned George Voigt, in the lower bracket.

Voigt sprang perhaps the biggest upset today by the thoroughness with which he eliminated Seattle's Scotty Campbell, two-time Canadian titleholder, 4 and 3, despite a painfully cut finger.

Voigt's mishap was caused when he pulled off a loose string from one of his clubs.

Upon Voigt's slim shoulders rest the responsibility of meeting Britain's foremost challenge for this crown since Phil Perkins had the dubious distinction of being trounced, 10 and 9 by Bobby Jones in the finals of the 1928 tournament at Brae Burn, Massachusetts.
