livestock markets. Today's offering

was made up of 211 cattle, 326 sheep

and lambs, 1,100 hogs and 230 calves,

including 77 cattle, 162 sheep, 211

hogs and 130 calves left over from

yesterday.

Cattle were drab. A few com-

mon bulls weighed up at \$2.50 to \$3.

Calves were steady at \$9 to \$10 for

good veals and around \$3 to \$3.50 for

common light grass calves. Lambs

were unchanged. Good ewes and

wethers brought \$7.75. Culls and

bucks were discounted \$2 per cwt.

Sheep were slow sellers at \$2 to \$3.50.

Hogs were about steady at \$12 to

\$12.25 for hams and butchers, with

\$1 premium per hog on select.

Heavies were around \$11, feeders sold

up to \$11.50, sows were mostly \$10.

On one market where only 330 hogs

were offered, sales were made at

\$11.50 to \$11.75 for hams and

butchers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The business developments over the prolonged week

clines of three or four points. Subsequently, the market steadied at a point or

two places in the leadership of U. S. Steel, American Can, Allied Chemical and
