The dealers prices were:—Black oats per bus forty-five, white oats per bus forty-three; pressed hay per ton, nine fifty to ten dollars; pressed straw per ton five fifty to six; potatoes per bus twenty to twenty-three; eggs per doz twenty-five cents; pork per lb nine and three-quarters to ten and three-eighths and ten and one-half for inspected.
