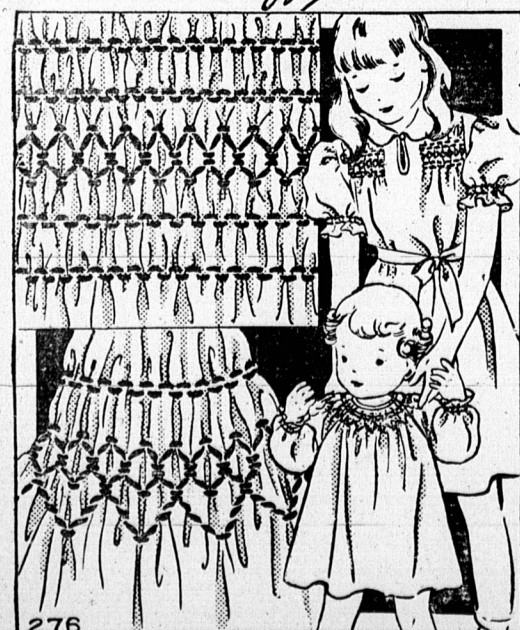

## THE COOK'S CORNER

### CELERY AND OLIVE SANDWICHES

1 cup finely-diced celery 1-4 cup chopped, stuffed olives. Mayonnaise. 1 loaf wholewheat bread. Mix chopped celery and olives with enough mayonnaise to spread. Spread between slices of bread. Cut into squares and garnish each sandwich with a slice of stuffed olive. Makes 18 small sandwiches.

### MOCK PATE DE FOIS GRAS SANDWICHES

1-4 lb. liverwurst 1 cup minced parsley 2 tablespoons mayonnaise 1 loaf whitebread Watercress or parsley Remove casing from liverwurst and mash. Add parsley and mayonnaise and mix well. Spread between slices of buttered white bread. Cut into diamond-shaped sandwiches. Garnish plate with watercress or parsley. Makes 18 small sandwiches.

### ALMOND SANDWICHES

1 3-oz. pkg. cream cheese 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1-4 pound salted almonds 2 loaves wholewheat bread. Mash the cream cheese, and mix thoroughly with the lemon juice to a spreading consistency. Chop salted almonds and add. Spread between buttered slices of wholewheat bread. Cut in "fingers." Makes 30 small sandwiches.

### CHICKEN AND PINEAPPLE SANDWICHES

1 cup canned crushed pineapple 1 cup chopped cooked or canned chicken 2 loaves white bread 1-2 pound cooked meats 1-2 cup mayonnaise Drain pineapple, and mix with the chopped chicken and mayonnaise. Spread between buttered slices of white bread. Cut each sandwich into quarters diagonally, forming triangles. This recipe makes 50 sandwiches.

### OPEN LOBSTER SANDWICHES

1 12-oz. can lobster, minced 2 tablespoons lemon juice 3 tablespoons mayonnaise 3 tablespoons French dressing 2 loaves white bread. Combine all ingredients adding additional seasoning to taste. Spread on buttered rounds of white bread. Garnish each with a sprig of parsley. Makes 10 sandwiches.

## How Can I???

Q. How can I prevent creases when ironing linen suits?

A. Iron the inner pockets and the heavy seams first, when pressing linen suits. This will do away with creases when the garments are given the final touches.

Q. How can I renew old Mason jar lids?

A. Sometime before canning season, collect all these lids, place them in a vessel and cover with buttermilk. Leave them for a day or two and they will appear practically new.

Q. How can I remove peach stains from linen?

A. First soak the stains; then apply cream of tartar, and put in the sun to dry. After it is dry, wash thoroughly.

## Household Scrapbook

### Washing Velvet

You can wash velvet very nicely if you squeeze the garment gently through a mild suds. Do not wring, but place on hanger dripping. Wring thoroughly, if it may be pressed lightly on the wrong side if necessary. Do not moisten.

### Mildew on Shoes

Mildew often forms on shoes that have not been worn for a long time. This can be removed by rubbing the spots with petroleum ointment. After a little rubbing, the marks will disappear.

### Clogging Downspouts

Clogged downspouts may often be opened by dropping a few generous handfuls of ordinary rock salt into them where they connect with the eaves.

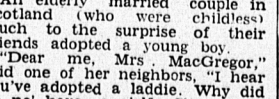

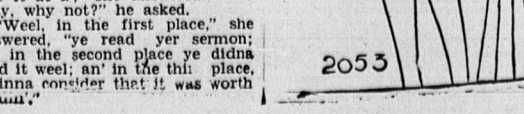
