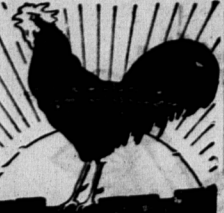

American Officers Will Travel in ZR-3 Across the Atlantic

(United States) FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Oct. 6. — Most of the crew of 26 officers and men of the ZR-3, after arriving at Lakehurst, New Jersey, will remain in the United States. Positions already have been obtained for them in connection with the building of dirigibles for commercial purposes.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, president of the Zeppelin airship company and commander of the ZR-3 on the trans-Atlantic trip, however, plans to return to Germany after a stay of two or three months in America. Dr. Eckener has arranged to visit New York, where he will spend a month or so, and from there goes to Chicago, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Detroit and other cities where he will inspect various plants of particular interest to him. Captain Ernest A. Lehmann, executive officer of the ZR-3 on the flight, who was in America last spring, will join the forces of the Goodyear-Zeppelin company.

Dr. Eckener and his crew will have charge of the ZR-3, after arrival at Lakehurst, until the ship has passed further inspections by American naval officers. When the dirigible has been accepted by the United States Navy Captain George W. Steele, who was assigned to make the trans-Atlantic flight as an observer, will take command. Lieutenant Commander S. M. Kraus, U. S. Navy, who is to be engineer officer of the ZR-3, and Major F. M. Kennedy, U. S. Army, also were designated to make the voyage to Lakehurst as observers. These three Americans will be the only persons on board outside the members of the crew.

The full list of the German crew which will take the ZR-3 across the Atlantic follows: Dr. Hugo Eckener, commanding officer; Captain Ernest A. Lehmann, executive and watch officer; Hans C. Flemming, navigating and watch officer; William C. Siegle, chief engineer; Franz A. Witte, chief quartermaster; Hans von Schiller and Walter Scherz, assistant quartermasters.

Following are the warrant officers: Ludwig Marx, ruler helmsman; Max Fruss and Carl A. Sammler, elevator helmsmen; Willy Sebeck, chief radio operator; Leonard Freund and Johann R. L. Ludwig, assistant radio operators; Gustave E. Belser, chief machinist; August H. Grozinger, Hermann Pfaff, Emil Martin, Hermann Pfabst and Carl Tielmann, assistant machinists. The remainder of the crew will be made up of seven petty officers.

SMUTS FEARS HERTZOG RIDING FOR A TUMBLE LONDON, Oct. 6. — Former Premier J. C. Smuts of South Africa, in a speech at Maritzburg yesterday, according to the Daily Telegraph's Cape Town correspondent, referred to recent speeches by supporters of the Hertzog government suggesting that the nationalists would be in power in South Africa for all time and he prophesied that the present government would be out sooner than the South African party, of which Mr. Smuts is leader, really desired.

The former premier said that personally he was anxious that the country should have full opportunity of putting the promises of the nationalists as well as their state-manship, to a practical test.

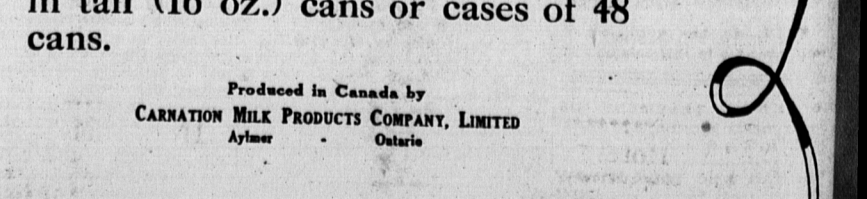
