### SMALL FARMS.

In a letter elsewhere in this issue John B. MacFadyen asks some pointed questions. Would we do away with the dairy business, with hog-raising, with sheep and cattle raising, the growing of seed oats, and substitute therefor small holdings?

To all these and similar questions we unhesitatingly reply, if they are less profitable than the smaller farms, cut them out by all means. If the dairy business, hog-raising, sheep, cattle and horse raising, and the growing of seed oats or any other seeds cannot be successfully followed in this province without driving our people out of the province at the rate of a thousand a year, then cut them all out and substitute something, anything, that will keep our people with us. "If thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out." The large farms and our present manner of working them have been instrumental in driving our people away; therefore, if we want to keep our people and if it is desirable to keep them, there must be a change.

This requires no proof. Our province is not large enough for any more people than we have at present under our present system of farming. This, Mr. MacFadyen or any one else can figure out by dividing our total area of, say, a million acres into one

### POINTERS FROM THE LAND.

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, of Fredericton, N. B., and well known in this province, having been for some years pastor of the Summerside Presbyterian Congregation, writing to a Canadian paper from England, where he is at present visiting, tells of a Sabbath spent in London.

As a clergyman should, even when away from home, Dr. Smith attended church, morning and evening. One of the points which he emphasizes, unfortunately a novel sight for a Canadian, was that during the morning service, in a church with a seating capacity of two thousand and comfortably filled, "the great majority were men." In the evening, "half an hour before the service began every seat was taken and hundreds were seated in the passages. The men were still in the great majority."

In Canadian cities, none of which it is necessary to name, the general, almost the invariable, rule is that the majority to be found in church, Sunday morning or evening or on Wednesday evening, are women.

The point that Dr. Smith makes is not that London women are not as good as they ought to be but that the men attend church in larger numbers, proportionately, than they do in Canada. And he gives some reasons which are worth noting. We quote:—

"The secret is found in two facts. First there is the preacher, the Rev. C. Silvester Horne, M. A., who is also a member of the British House of Commons. Such a combination of theology and politics would demolish most, if not all Canadian churches. As Canadians we pride ourselves upon our freedom from traditional institutions and our independence of the dead-weight of the past. Yet in Canada it is a fact that we have, on account of our party system in politics, become so selfish and narrow that it is extremely dangerous for a minister to discuss the most vital public questions in the pulpit. The partisan and the party press at once attack him as a party politician, and as there are always timid ones in the fold he is asked to be silent or resign. Here in London is a preacher in the House of Commons doing his work as a minister and as the representative in Parliament and held in the highest esteem by all parties and loved by his people of every shade of political opinion."

The other fact to which reference is made is the work done by the church. This includes Sunday afternoon meetings for men, organized as a brotherhood, a special feature being an address by some outside speaker, lay or clerical. For week days and evenings there were men's meetings, women's meetings, Young People's Institute, Men's Club, Men's and Women's Club, Men's Gymnastic Club, Boys' Club, Swimming Club, Rambling Club, Cycling Club, Tennis Club and a number of other associations and clubs, announcement of the meetings of which was given as part of the order of service.

"And the men were in the great majority." This is the result of the system followed.

In Canada we have raised a barrier between religious and, so-called, secular activity. It is perfectly legitimate for us to discuss politics and world problems at public "secular" meetings but we would be shocked unspeakably if these matters were discussed in connection even with our week-night church services. Politics does not constitute any part of our religious life and our politics shows it.

It is perfectly legitimate for us to play tennis, golf, cricket, hockey, and other games, but they must be rigidly excluded from our church institutions and they, too, show it.

If our churches are "the salt of the earth" they should "salt" our secular as well as our religious life and their influence should extend to the controlling and the purifying and enabling of our sports and pastimes.

### NOTES.

The marked success which attended the entertainment by amateur talent in the Charlottetown Opera House, Friday evening, leads to the hope that the development of amateur talent may be still further followed in Charlottetown. We have our athletic associations which provide for physical recreation. Indeed the tendency of the present age is very largely in the direction of physical, muscular, gymnastic development. Could not much more be done in the way of mental gymnastics? There is abundance of histrionic, musical, elocutionary talent awaiting development. Why not clubs which might occasionally meet in friendly rivalry in mental gymnastics as our athletic clubs meet to compare their physical prowess? Here is an opportunity for some of our church organizations.

Referring to the cancellation of an order given by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company for the construction of four large steamers at an expenditure of about twelve millions, a United States exchange says: "This is the first concrete result of the passage and signature of the canal bill. There were many 'lean' years in the history of the steamship company. Not until its absorption by a railroad did the process of fattening begin. As each company was a feeder for the other, the advantages were mutual and all concerned were benefited. Never was there a clearer case of one hand washing the other and both the face, but Congress has peculiar notions on such subjects, to say nothing of a pronounced partiality for riders. So, there is gloom in the shipyards, exasperation in the offices of two companies and jubilation in Japan. Elsewhere, disgust."

### A FARMER'S QUESTIONS.

Sir:—I have read your different articles in regard to farming on this Island and would really like to know what your idea is of a farm on P. E. Island.

Do you mean to do away with the dairy and pork industries, the raising of sheep, cattle, and horses, the growing of seed oats that you always mention at Seed Fair time, etc. on those small holdings you advocate?

Mr. Vroom, Dominion Fruit Inspector, at the Fruit Grower's Association, in Charlottetown last fall, advised the Island farmers to keep following all present lines. They should not neglect general farming for the sake of apple growing. Let them keep up their mixed farming but at the same time grow all the fruit they can.

James Denchar of Scotland, one of the British manufacturers who were in Canada this year, speaking of farming in the Maritime Provinces, said: "I never saw such a waste of opportunity. The farmers do not get all they should out of the land. I fancy one reason is that the farms are so small, most of them being between one and two hundred acres, with a farmer necessarily having a limited capital. There are only one or two small holdings of this kind on my land and I have more trouble with them than all the rest put together."
