THE NEW RAILWAY STATION.

Are we to have a new railway station built in Charlottetown this summer? The question is urgent. Years ago the Superintendent, the railway staff, seven or eight doctors and the general public condemned the present station as unhealthy and in effect said it was slowly poisoning all who lived and worked within it. All would like to save the lives and health of these worthy officials. And this cannot be done by erecting the new building at the foot of Hillsboro street, which is if anything more water-soaked and slimy than the present site. As for the present building it is, to say the least, not creditable to Charlottetown—a mere shell of a structure. Some do not hesitate to call it a disgrace to the city and to the Railway Department.

The people have signified in the plainest possible way where they want the new station built. They have done this by resolution of our business men in the Board of Trade, by resolution of the City Council elected by the people, by memorials sent to Ottawa by deputations that have waited on Mr. Blair, Mr. Fielding and Mr. Prefontaine, by advocacy in the daily press representing both parties and in almost every other possible way in which the general consensus of opinion can be made known. It would be hard to find in any city of Canada a more remarkable unanimity of opinion on a like important local question. Surely the people have a right to be heard in this matter. True, there are an interested few who seek to thwart the public will by secret and underhand methods—secret and underhand because that it is the only possible way to influence those in authority against the George Street site.

We have two representatives at Ottawa, Messrs. McKinnon and Hazard, both residents of this city and both fully aware of the facts above recited. On them rests the responsibility in large measure of seeing that the new station shall be built without delay and built where it ought to be. That responsibility cannot be evaded, nor have we any right to assume that they desire to evade it. We write this by way of a reminder to our representatives, lest they forget how very vital a question this is here felt to be. It is high time that all suspense was ended in this matter, the site selected and the money voted. We shall be glad to aid our representatives in carrying

ing out the people's clearly expressed wishes, and at the same time we must remind them that we have had enough of delay and suspense, and that there is more than a possibility of very unpleasant consequences if a small minority of interested persons are permitted to override the reasonable wishes of the great majority in this matter.
