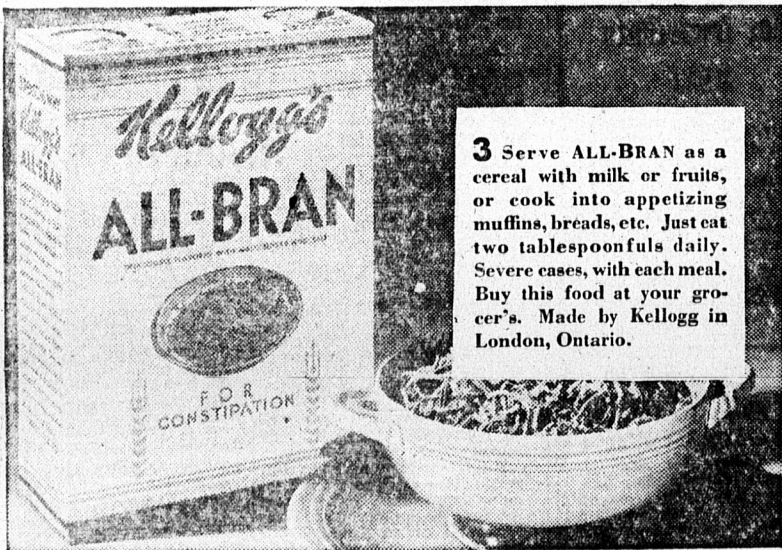

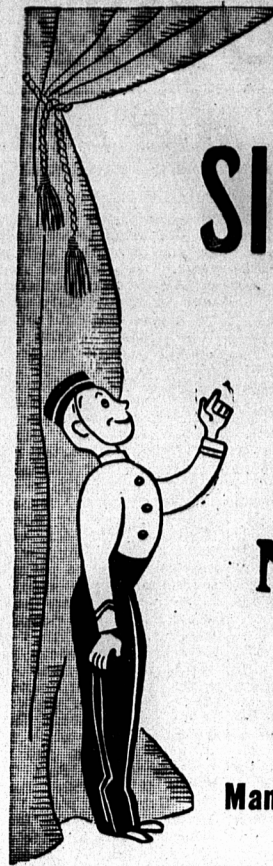
A meeting of the College Time staff was held Wednesday at which the Editor Miss Jean MacDonal, reported that progress was being made on the work of the college paper.
