ISLANDER KILLED.—John Harvey, belonging to Charlottetown was struck by a shunting engine in the I. C. R. yards at New Glasgow on the 16th and as a result of the injuries he sustained passed away shortly after. As soon as the accident occurred the injured man was conveyed to the Aberdeen Hospital, but he was soon beyond all medical aid. The deceased was in the employ of the Acadia Coal Company, and has a brother and sister in this city, who have deep sympathy in their sudden affliction.

SCOTT-ACT IN ST. JOHN.—A large number attended the special meeting held Thursday night in Keith's assembly rooms says a St. John exchange, under the auspices of the New Brunswick branch of the Dominion Alliance, most of the clergy of the city being present. On motion of Rev. H. E. Thomas, seconded by E. N. Stockford, J. Willard Smith was elected chairman. Rev. H. H. Stavert, of Harcourt, formerly of P. E. Island, field secretary of the New Brunswick branch, who has been in the city for some days in the interest of the organization, moved a resolution which was seconded by G. Hawkins, the first part of which is as follows: "That this meeting resolve itself into an association of temperance workers to be known as the St. John City and County Branch of the Dominion Alliance, to be constituted by those present, and other persons to be appointed from time to time by religious bodies, temperance societies, and other organizations, favoring the suppression of the liquor traffic." The resolution was adopted. Rev. H. E. Thomas, formerly of this city, is also an active worker for the cause.

SAD DEATH.—The death occurred in Charlottetown, on Tuesday, of Mrs. Edward Bradley, at the early age of twenty years. She leaves to mourn, a sorrowing husband and two children. The funeral takes place at 2 o'clock to-day (Thursday) from the residence of the father of the deceased, 137 Cumberland street, to the Railway Station, thence by train to Corran Bann.

SEVENTEEN CASES.—The Thiel detectives, engaged in seeking information against persons selling liquor on P. E. I., contrary to the Prohibition Act have left Charlottetown for Summerside. In the western capital about seventeen persons have yet to be tried for an infraction of the Act. It will take the detectives considerable time to give evidence before returning to Charlottetown to complete their work here.

SNOW FIGHTING.—On Monday morning, a double header with Conductor McCarron in charge went from Charlottetown to Georgetown, opening the track for the regular, and returned to Mt. Stewart at 4 o'clock with the intention of going to Souris, but unfortunately she got stuck in a large drift immediately east of the station, and was only with strenuous work she was set free at 9 o'clock. She remained at Mt. Stewart till morning and proceeded to Souris Tuesday morning.—L.

COMMITTEES FOR TRIAL.—Robert Reid, the man captured in Summerside and taken to Moncton charged with having robbed a boarding house in the latter place, was arraigned in the Moncton Police Court on the 19th and the case was adjourned till the afternoon when several witnesses were examined. The prisoner was committed for trial. On the previous day Officer Gage of the Moncton Force had gone to St. Anne and returned with the watch Reid is alleged to have stolen from a man named Murphy. The watch is alleged to have been sold originally to a round house employee. Reid's measurements and finger prints have been sent to Ottawa.

PROFITABLE SOCIAL.—Under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society of the Pownal Circuit a concert and pie social was held in the Hall Pownal, last Friday evening. Notwithstanding the bad roads there was a good attendance. The program was greatly enjoyed and enthusiastically applauded. Every number on the program was good. The soloists were Mr. Frederick Richards, Mrs. Wm. J. McEachern, Miss Vera Lane, Miss Ballem and Miss Edith Smith. Two dialogues and a reading (by J. A. Moore) and one or two other items, added to the solos, made a fine variety and a good time. The pies and the action time off by Mr. McEachern, of St. Albion, and brought good prices—all together the total receipts came close to \$40, which goes to the Parsonage Fund of the circuit. CASE AGAINST HERALD DISMISSED.—The case against the Halifax Herald has been technically dismissed, which was brought by the Crown Prosecutor for Halifax, applying for an order from the Supreme Court directing and calling upon Senator Dennis and Mr. W. B. McCurdy, publisher and editor, respectively, of the Herald, to show cause why a writ of attachment should not be issued against them for contempt of Court in respect to their publication of certain articles which it was claimed, were calculated to prejudice the fair trial of the cause of the King v. Cook. The case was tried before the Full Court, and the attendance in the Court on the occasion was larger than usual in view of the interest attaching to the proceedings. The case lasted several minutes, the application being dismissed upon the ground that the Crown Prosecutor had not served with the notice the affidavits on which he was moving. The defendants were represented by Mr. Mellish, K. C.

A GREAT SHOW.—At the Prince Edward Theatre last night, there was put on the screen an excellent programme, consisting of films of the varied and interesting character. There was, as usual, a large crowd, and to say that they thoroughly enjoyed the pictures is almost superfluous. The star film was "Casey" from the famous comedy by Tom Roberts, a play that has enjoyed a popular, almost unprecedented, popularity for many years; and unquestionably one of the cleverest that have been written. It deals with an aristocratic family on the one hand and a poor one on the other. George D'Alroy, son of Marquise de Eccles, a dancer, whose only possessions are a sprightly sister named Polly and a drunken father, George, who is in the army, is ordered to India, and the Marquise, coming to bid him good-bye, discovers Esther and her sister; hardly has she recovered from the shock of meeting her lovely daughter-in-law when old Eccles rears in and aggressively greet her. After a touching scene George goes off to India where he is reported to have been killed, and Esther finds herself in dire poverty, chiefly through her father's capacity for absorbing liquid refreshments. But George has only been captured and eventually he makes his escape and returns to England, overjoyed at his return and attracted by the sunny disposition of her little grandson, the Marquise becomes reconciled to her daughter-in-law, and thus the story ends happily. Old Eccles and his desperate efforts to secure the wherewithal to quench his awful thirst, and the incidental episode of the love affairs of Esther's sister, Polly, furnish an inexhaustible fund of humor which agreeably relieves the tragic side of the play. Splendidly enacted and excellently reproduced, the story was thoroughly appreciated. "The Death Trap" was another good picture, showing a detective running to earth a wily counterfeiter and finding for himself, at the same time, a pretty young wife. The scenery in this film was magnificent. "The Suicide Pact" was intensely humorous; a young pair of lovers, by putting their heads together, and devising an ingenious scheme in which they succeed in convincing the neighborhood that they have committed suicide arm in arm because of the "old man's" obduracy in their love affair, bring about a comical relapse on the part of the latter when he discovers that the young folk are not dead. But the picture of the evening was "That wit at ten", an hysterical story that must be seen and not described. It need hardly be said that the singing was loudly applauded.

It is asserted that Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg has already tendered his resignation, and that Foreign Secretary Von Jagow and the latter's under secretary, Zimmerman, will leave office at the same time with him. Dr. Soli, the Colonial Secretary, is mentioned as likely to be the new Foreign Secretary.

This story which, of course, must be taken with the utmost reserve, alleges that Von Bethmann-Hollweg will become Viceroy of Alsace-Lorraine in succession to Count Von Wedel, who will leave office in consequence of the failure of the Government in the recent crisis in the conquered province. The Vossische Zeitung adds that the statements come from dependable authorities and in such categorical form that it cannot refrain from giving them immediate publicity although it is unable to vouch for their accuracy. The Kaiser had a conference yesterday with the Chancellor, the War Minister, the chiefs of the general staff and his military cabinet, cent an hour to 11 per cent. of the weekly wages.
