Extend Air Mail Service
Mr. J. J. Gallant, district director of postal services, announced yesterday an extension of the air mail service to Sydney, Glace Bay, North Sydney, Sydney Mines and St. John's, New Brunswick.

At a well attended meeting of the Provincial Red Cross Executive held yesterday at Red Cross House Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, the President, was appointed as the Division's representative at meetings to be held in Toronto on December 3rd and 4th, with regard to the unification of Red Cross services. Mr. D. J. Bonnell, Chairman of the Jelly Committee, reported that 4,128 pounds of jelly had been shipped overseas and spoke in the highest terms of the wonderful work done by all those who assist with the project and of Mr. J. D. Jenkins' generosity in having placed his packing plant at the disposal of the Red Cross again this year. Miss Darrach told the Executive members that during Dr. Acker's recent clinics in the province 142 persons had been examined and 19 discharged—12 wish to be cured, 10 as improved and 3 unimproved. Reporting on the Emergency Nursing Reserve in the province Miss Darrach said there are now 75 classes in Home Nursing and Emergencies in War being given in the province with a total enrolment of nearly 1,800 members. These women receive if they attend 75% or more of the lectures. It is hoped that arrangements will be made to have these women continue to meet once a month to keep the course fresh in their minds. A Committee composed of Dr. MacMillan, Dr. Johnson and Miss Darrach was appointed to go into the matter of contacting doctors and nurses to form an Examination Board to draw up the tests to be given to those who have taken the Red Cross Home Nursing Course and qualify for a Red Cross Home Nursing Certificate.

New Regulations For Parcels For Prisoners of War
For some time letters reaching Canada from Canadian prisoners of war and civilian internees in Europe and North Africa have contained parcels of food. These parcels being sent to them by next-of-kin resident in Canada. However, the regulations governing parcels have been altered to restrict to clothing, small personal articles and chocolate. But since it is evident from reports received by the Red Cross that parcels being sent to them by next-of-kin are not sufficient to supply the needs of the prisoners, the regulations governing parcels have been altered to allow the inclusion of a number of additional food items. Such items will be permitted in addition to the parcels already listed in the regulations published by the Post Office Department concerning communications with prisoners of war in interned abroad. United States regulations governing parcels have recently been revised and a comparison between the new regulations in both countries reveals that the contents permitted in Canadian parcels are now substantially the same. The food items are intended for use by the prisoners and are to be added to the food already supplied in weekly Red Cross parcels and camp rations. In the selection of parcels the following items are preferred: preference of the prisoners themselves and of the restrictions imposed by the German and Italian Governments. The following food items, subject to their being available, are permitted under the new regulations: 1. Dehydrated fruits and berries up to one pound in weight. 2. Dehydrated soups up to 1-2 pounds. 3. Shelled nuts up to one pound. 4. Hard chocolate and or cocoa up to 2 pounds. 5. Coffee up to one pound. 6. Tea up to 1-4 pound. 7. Sugar or hard candies up to 2 pounds. 8. Dried chipped beef up to 1-4 pound. 9. Spices up to 3 ounces. 10. Curry powder up to 2 ounces.

Provincial Red Cross Executive Holds Meeting
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Responsibility of Minor Involved In Court Case
The responsibility of a minor in signing a promissory note for fertilizer was the question involved in the case of a young man, 19 years of age, who was sued by the fertilizer company. The case was heard in the County Court of Queen's County. Parties to the suit were Lyman O'Brien, plaintiff, and William G. Houlahan, defendant. The judgment, which was entered in favor of the plaintiff, follows: "It is held that the contract for the sale of the fertilizer to the defendant was entirely for the benefit of the defendant and he is bound to pay. Judgment will therefore be entered for the plaintiff for \$75.00 and costs."
