BALDWIN MINISTRY FORMED READY FOR PARLIAMENT

LONDON, May 27.—The new administration was completed tonight and is in readiness to meet parliament, which re-assembles on Monday. The official list of the Cabinet and other officials issued tonight shows the substitution of Lord Robert Cecil as Lord Privy Seal for Arthur Bonar Law, who held this portfolio in addition to the premiership, and the promotion of Mr. Bonar Law's secretary John C. Davidson, to a place in the government as chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

German Workers Ready to Give Loan Guarantees

Oldest War Vet Buried Yesterday

Capt. Garrett Hubley, 83 years of age, veteran of the Great War, is dead. He was discharged from the Canadian Naval Force, and saw active service in Canada.

FROM THE TIME OF HIS DISCHARGE IN 1918, HE RECEIVED ONLY \$100 IN THE FORM OF A GRATUITY. HE, OR HIS FAMILY RECEIVED ABSOLUTELY NOTHING IN PENSION. The late Capt. Hubley was taken on the strength of the Royal Canadian Navy in 1917, being then 77 years of age, or some 37 years of age. When he was discharged it was claimed, that because he enlisted over age, he was not entitled to a pension. What rot. Apparently he was not thoroughly medically examined upon enlistment or upon his discharge. He had a cancerous growth on the lip shortly after discharge which he claimed was due to service and which kept on growing. For the cure of this growth he was given \$100. And then the Army fought all about him. At one time there were hundreds of young men receiving courses at the Business Colleges and at various trade centers, as a part remuneration for their war services. There were many hundreds of young men receiving \$100 a month. This is no disparagement to these young men they deserved everything they got. But what about this old veteran "too old to enlist" those who held things in charge before the Bonar Law resignation. When Mr. Baldwin failed to secure the Robert Borden for the Chancellorship he invited Mr. McKenna, who was a member of the Asquith administration but lately shows signs of veering towards the Conservative side of politics to accept the portfolio. Mr. McKenna is just recovering from an illness, and he has promised to join the government at the end of two or three months, providing his health at that time has reached a satisfactory state. This promise of Mr. McKenna will tend to influence the government's attitude on all financial and commercial circles.

PURCHASE OF STEAM ROLLER COMPLETED AT BRANTFORD

Mayor Jenkins and Coun. Rattray Returned Saturday Night After Interesting Visit.

France Will Not Interfere in Turkish-Greek Dispute

(Canadian Press) PARIS, May 27.—The French government asked Great Britain and Italy through their ambassadors in Paris to join it in making urgent representations to Athens to the effect that the Allies are determined not to become involved in a possible Greek conflict, and would neither prevent the Turkish army from crossing to Thrace nor allow the Greek fleet to enter the Dardanelles.
