Crystals Lose To Campbellton 8-1

(Special to the Guardian) CAMPBELLTON, Mar. 17.—The visiting Summerside team were defeated in their first outing game at Campbellton tonight by a score of 8-1.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Mar. 17.—Dominion livestock.—There were 103 cattle, 18 sheep, 154 hogs and 1,302 calves for sale on the two markets this morning. The cattle offering was made up of one load medium Northwest steers, common dairy type cows and bulls of local origin. Prices were unchanged from yesterday. Calves were plentiful and prices lower.

One or two small lots of the best calves realized \$8.00 and straight lots of common to medium ones brought \$7.00. Two carloads of light sucker calves were sold for \$6.50. Poor quality again dominated the offerings and condemnations were heavy in some cases over fifty per cent. Hogs sold in mixed lots for \$13.75 and select \$14.25.

Deeds Over Valuable Property to S'side Y. M. C. A.

(S'side Journal) The Young Men's Christian Association of Summerside, has come into possession of a splendid property through the generosity of one of Summerside's citizens, Mr. W. K. Llewellyn, who has donated to the local institution, in memory of his mother, his property on the corner of Notre Dame and Sumner Streets.

This property comprises a lot of land 65x75 feet, along with a two storey double tenement residence 30x45 feet and is situated in one of the very best localities in Summerside.

Mr. Llewellyn makes this splendid gift without any strings attached to it, merely asking that it be used and occupied by the Association as soon as it can be conveniently remodelled, and with the sole stipulation that, if at a future date, the Y. M. C. A. should discontinue its work here, the donor then desires that the sum of five hundred dollars be donated to home missions.

The meeting of the Advisory Board of the Y. M. C. A. was held last evening at which Mr. Llewellyn's splendid offer came up and was strongly recommended to the regular board.

Secretary H. H. Simpson at a special meeting held immediately afterward related how two months ago Mr. Llewellyn had made this offer verbally. The offer was made known to the National Council and Mr. Patton the National Secretary had come to Summerside last Wednesday to see the property. With the local secretary and a contract-making of any necessary changes or they had inspected the building in plans and to help in every way possible.

It was also decided that the sincere thanks of the Y. M. C. A. be suitably tendered the donor in writing.

A committee was appointed to look into the matter of making necessary alterations to the building, ascertaining approximate cost, etc.

On motion of L. B. Crue seconded by Mr. J. W. Lidstone, who spoke in terms of high appreciation of Mr. Llewellyn's offer, the gift was unanimously accepted.

Formal Opening (Continued from Page 1.)

As the Lieutenant Governor alighted from his carriage the band played the National Anthem. His Honor then took the salute after the Guard had presented arms and he entered the building, proceeding to the disrobing room and from there to the Assembly Chamber, preceded by the Usher of the Black Rod and accompanied by his three Aides, his private secretary and the following other military officers: Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, C. de G., D. S. O., Lt.-Col. W. C. Cook, Lieut.-Col. Allan McLeod,

Major G. E. Full, Capt. J. R. Paton M. C., Adjutant, Capt. W. J. Macdonald, Lieutenants DesRoches and Kelly.

The Speaker, Hon. L. L. Jenkins, left the chair as His Honor entered the Chamber. The Governor took his seat and then read the following:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

On this the first occasion since my appointment as representative of His Most Gracious Majesty the King, I have great pleasure in welcoming you to the discharge of your Legislative duties.

It is with a sense of gratitude and satisfaction that we note the gradual return to normalcy of world economic and trade conditions from the destruction and dislocation brought about by war and post war disturbances.

In our own Province during the past season we were favored with ideal weather conditions, and, as a result, with a harvest as fine in quality and as large perhaps as any in our history.

It is a matter for regret that conditions in our neighboring Provinces have prevented us from finding there the markets for our farm products which we formerly enjoyed and which were so convenient and satisfactory. There are signs, however, of an ever-growing sentiment among the people of the Maritime Provinces in favor of more united effort towards such amelioration of our economic conditions as will enable these Provinces to fulfil their destiny as an integral and important part of the Canadian Confederation.

While the price of dairy products and potatoes was somewhat lower than that of last year, it was more than offset by the higher prices for pork, poultry and seed grain.

My Government, through its Department of Agriculture, is endeavoring to render fullest service where most required. Every activity worthy of recognition has received encouragement and aid. Requests from organizations representative of the various agricultural activities of the Province, such as the Dairy Association, Sheep Breeders' Association and Live Stock bodies, are carefully considered and supported. A strong desire for co-operation is more and more permeating the various branches of agriculture, and there is a persistent demand for assistance in the organization and fostering of co-operative marketing. The excellent results achieved by existing co-operative agricultural organizations in marketing their products in poor as well as in good years induces such demands.

The Potato Growers' Association has greatly increased its market for seed potatoes, and has made large shipments which netted double the price of table stock. The Association has been of great educational value to the Province.

The grant for Technical Education is being used to the fullest extent under a system greatly reducing the cost to the Province, and giving assistance to several of our industries not heretofore included.

It is pleasing to note that there are no vacant schools now in the Province, and that there is a larger proportion of teachers of the higher grades engaged therein than ever before. The relatively large number of schools with an attendance below the statutory requirement and the consequent comparative increase in the per capita cost of common school education throughout the Province is a matter that merits your serious consideration.

With a view to extending and enlarging the general sphere of usefulness of Prince of Wales College, and at the same time participating in the Federal grant for Technical Education, a commercial course extending over two years is being organized in that institution. Short courses in technical subjects, supplemented by English and Arithmetic, are also being established.

During the past year a heavy program of Highway Improvement and bridge construction was undertaken by the Department of Public Works, and I am pleased to state that as a result many fine bridges of steel and concrete construction, a large number of concrete culverts and about eight thousand feet of steel culverts have been added to the permanent public works of the Province, while one hundred and fifteen miles

of new road projects were completely graded, ditched and machined, and a larger mileage belonging to previous years' projects were finished and passed.

In addition to this program the secondary highways of the Province were well maintained, and all the roads and bridges damaged by the destructive tidal storm of October, 1923, were repaired or replaced by new structures.

For the present year there still remains about one hundred thousand dollars for expenditure on Highway Improvement account, and it is proposed to use a large part of this amount on permanent bridges and make a start on gravelling the roads approaching the principal centres, as the Department finds it impossible to maintain clay roads in good condition where the traffic concentrates on the main arteries leading to the city and larger towns. A system of maintenance for the improved highways is also being established for the coming season which, I trust, will provide for the upkeep of these roads in a satisfactory manner and thus obtain for the larger Highway Expenditure that value which was lacking without such maintenance.

The breeding and raising of silver black foxes in captivity fully maintains its importance as a leading industry of the Province. During the past season the returns, therefrom have exceeded that of any previous year. Recognizing the great importance of the industry to the Province at large, my Government, during recess, has completed an arrangement with the Federal Department of Agriculture under which an Experimental Station will be established in which will be carried on scientific investigation into the feeding and breeding of these animals.

The co-operative spirit is not confined to those engaged in agriculture. During the past year a Fishermen's Union has been organized under authority of a Statute passed at your last Session, and I trust that the movement thus inaugurated may grow and be a lasting benefit to those engaged in this all-important industry.

You will be pleased to know that the changes in the system of accounting in the several Departments of the Public Service promised a year ago have been inaugurated and make greatly for simplicity and accuracy. I am assured that the system as now established is fully up to the standard of other Provinces.

During the year it became necessary to issue debentures to provide for the payment of expenditures upon highway improvement, and my Government determined to invite offers at the same time for the purchase of additional bonds to pay off the amount owing by way of overdraft at the Bank of Montreal upon which for some years the Province has been paying five and one-half per cent. interest. Accordingly debentures to the total amount of five hundred thousand dollars were offered and were sold at the best price obtained for any Provincial Government bonds during the year. As these bonds bear only four and one-half per cent. interest, a considerable annual saving on interest charge will thus be made. I am also pleased to inform you that proper securities have been purchased by my Government to provide for the Debenture Sinking Funds in accordance with the requirements of the Statutes.

Among the Legislative measures to be submitted for your consideration will be an Act respecting Coroners and amendments to the Road Act, Taxation Act and other Statutes.

The Public Accounts for the past year will be placed before you, and the Estimates for Revenue and Expenditure for the current year, prepared with due regard for economy and efficiency, will be submitted for your consideration.

In leaving you to the performance of your duties, I hope that your deliberations under the guidance of Divine Providence may be for the benefit of our people and the prosperity of this fair Province.
