STUFFED SPARERIBS 3 pounds pork spareribs 2 cups soft bread crumbs 1 teaspoon salt 1-4 cup finely chopped onion 1-4 cup finely chopped onion 2 tablespoons melted fat or butter

Method: Select lean spareribs of young pork. Prepare the stuffing for the spareribs by mixing the seas nings and the finely c-opped onion with the bread crumbs, then adding the melted drippings or butter—work this in with the fingers, tips or with a spoon.

Spread each sparerib with stuffing and roll up like a jelly-roll and shape. Place on a rack in an open roasting pan and spread each r-ill thinly with soft fat. Place in a hot oven (450 deg. F.) for about 15 to 20 minutes, and then lower the heat sharply to moderately slow (300 to 325 deg. F.) and continue cooking with frequent basting, until the spareribs are done, for about an hour or longer. Remove strings or skewers before serving the stuffed spareribs on a hot platter.

FRIED APPLE RINGS Wash and core firm red apples. Do not remove the skins. Cut the apples in 1-2-inch slices and cut sugar, which has been mixed with flour, on both sides with a w-rench. Dip the slices in the egg and crumb mixture, then fry in hot oil until browned on one side, then turn over and sprinkle the cooked side with brown sugar with frank.

Another way to do these is to place the raw apple slices (not coated with the brown sugar mixture), in a pan with melted fat. Cook until browned on one side, then turn over and sprinkle the cooked side with brown sugar until the sugar has melted and the apple slices are cooked thoroughly.

CELERY STUFFING 3 cups soft bread cubes 1-4 cup diced salt p rk 1-4 cup chopped onion 1-4 cup salt 3-4 teaspoon salt 1-8 teaspoon pepper Method: Fry the salt pork until crisp, then remove the pieces. Cook the onion in the fat for a few minutes, then add the crisp salt pork pieces. Season with salt and pepper and spread on the spareribs. Bake as directed in the first recipe.

Many people who reap their lawns, lawns, trees and shrubs do not realize the importance and advantage of a complete fertilizer. Here is a complete, balanced fertilizer, containing all of the elements required by plants for best growth, and developed by the best scientists in the world.

1. Vegetables fed with a complete balanced plant food are far superior in quality to vegetables that are not fed. The finest vegetables are produced on a fertile soil where growth is as rapid as possible. Rapid growth produces tender asparagus and beans, cabbage that has a fine firm head and is easily shredded to a fine, ly-cut texture; carrots with the delicate flavor that comes only in young, tender, quick-grown produce; cucumbers uniform in shape and of excellent color; grown on vines that are thrifty, and disease-resistant; crisp, tender young radishes that can be harvested in 20 to 30 days after sowing; tomatoes that are uniform in size and shape, well-colored, with unbroken, well-latched skins. A vegetable that properly grown is tender, crisp, succulent, with a delicate flavor, if you feed your plants with a complete balanced plant food you will have no tough, pithy, and fibrous vegetables.

2. Not only will a complete, balanced plant food give increased quality to your vegetable garden; it will result in increased yields as well. Also, vegetables will mature earlier and you will have a longer harvesting season. The application of plant food to the vegetable garden is not a difficult task. After the seed bed is prepared, apply the plant food at the rate of 4 lbs. per 100 square feet (one rounded tablespoon to one square foot) and rake lightly into the soil. Then sow your seed in the usual manner.

Or if you prefer row application, use two pounds of plant food for 100 square feet when the soil is prepared, apply the plant food in a strip approximately six inches wide, and then rake it into the soil before planting the seed.

For vegetables grown in hills, or in transplanting, mix a level tablespoon of plant food thoroughly with the soil in the bottom of the hill before planting.

For vegetables that require a long growing season, such as tomatoes, cabbage, celery, peppers, etc., use four pounds of plant food per 100 square feet when the bed is prepared. Then feed a heaping tablespoon per square foot every six weeks thereafter.

Do the work yourself—It is exercise and recreation. Plan before you plant. Intelligent planning is based on knowledge of proper planting dates for each vegetable, the soil conditions, and the length of time required for maturity.

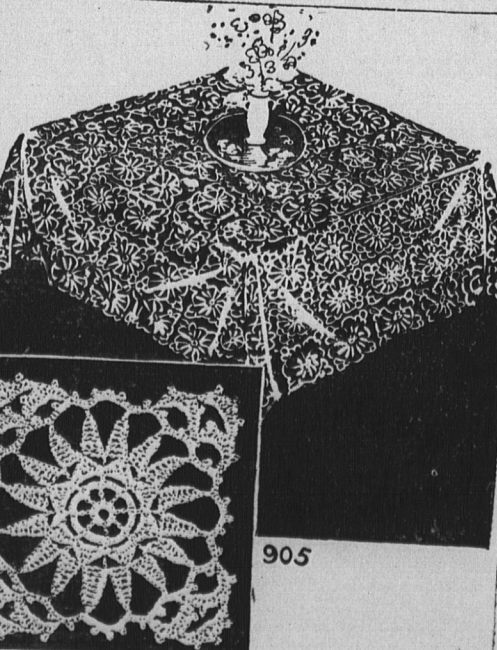
