Epworth League Convention.

HELD IN EPWORTH HALL

Rev. Dr. Stevenson Present and Delivers an Excellent Address.

The Epworth League convention of the Summerside district met in Epworth Hall, Summerside, on Thursday at 2.30 p. m. In the absence of the President (Bro. T. Hodgson), the Rev. N. McLaughlin was elected president pro tem. Bro. F. C. Stephenson, M. D. of Toronto was present, also the pastors of all the circuits except, Bideford and Hunter River. The session opened with devotional exercises consisting of Scripture reading, singing and prayer by Dr. Stephenson and Rev. G. F. Dawson. The president then briefly stated the object of the meeting, and warmly welcomed Dr. Stephenson.

At this point, there was elected a business committee of five, consisting of Miss Strong, Miss Clark, Mr. Wightman, Mr. Dawson and Mrs. Wright. While this committee was doing its work Dr. Stephenson gave a very interesting and helpful talk on the Missionary organization of Methodist Church, from the General Superintendent down to the Quarterly Boards, and the individual members of the Church, using a chart to illustrate his point of discussion. After his soul-stirring remarks, Bro. Wightman led in prayer which was followed by singing, "All for Jesus". This was a time of special blessing and power.

Reports of Leagues were then given from Tryon, Bedeque, Alberton and Summerside.

Mrs. E. Wright then read a thoughtfully prepared paper on the Epworth League as a missionary educator. A discussion on this paper followed, when some very helpful thoughts were expressed.

This week the King was a frequent visitor at the home of Col. Charles Elliott who died.

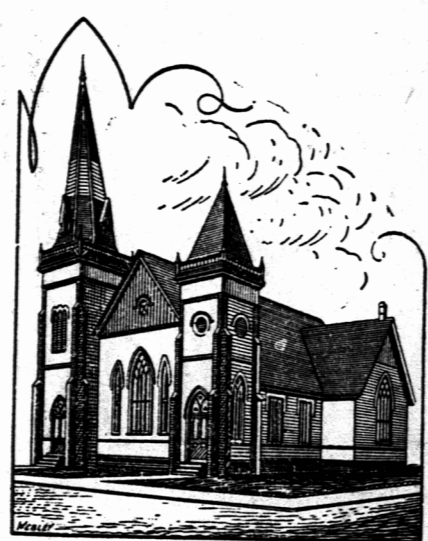
The old soldier was one of the King's suite on his American tour.

Mrs. Bradford Gough then read an excellent paper on the privileges and duties of Epworth League workers in which she emphasized the importance of an every day, all round, Christian life. The convention was then favored with a solo by Miss Wright.

Dr. Stephenson here, with the aid of maps and charts, addressed the meeting on the Forward Movement for Missions. He said in part: The Forward Movement is made up of little things—little prayers, little study and little givings. Little things shape life, make life. The Doctor described in a very interesting manner his call when the Missionary Board was unable, for lack of funds, to send him out. Then through prayer and meditation, he thought of the assistance the young people in all our societies might render, hence the Forward Movement for Missions.

Pledges were then scattered through the audience asking for systematic praying, studying and giving.

The Convention then closed with a solo by Miss Gough and benediction by Rev. A. E. Chapman.

At the close, a goodly number remained to talk with the Doctor and examine his missionary literature and curios. A considerable amount of these was purchased by the people.

At a meeting held in Mr. Neil McLeod's office Thursday night the organization of a yachting club was completed and will be known as the Summerside Yacht Club, with upwards of sixty members. A code of bye-laws was submitted and adopted. The election of officers resulted as follows:—Commodore, Capt. John L. Read, Vice Commodore, Harry T. Holman; Rear Commodore, L. B. Grady; secretary, A. C. Saunders; treasurer, Neil McLeod; executive and sailing committee, Wm. Matheson; Wm. Strang; Basil Kelly; Pascal Gallant; Lucas Allen. A meeting of the executive will be held Tuesday night to arrange a program for the summer.

A SPECIAL meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held Friday night to receive a report of a committee appointed at a former meeting relative to the proposed steamship company. The President, Hon. R. C. McLeod, occupied the chair, and in his opening remarks explained that the object of this meeting was the adoption of a prospectus for the guidance of shareholders, and to discuss ways and means for the organization of a steamship company. Mr. Richard Hunt on behalf of the committee, submitted a draught prospectus, which was adopted by the Board. After a full discussion it was resolved that the capital stock of the company be placed at \$50,000, to be divided into 1,000 shares of \$50 each. A general discussion followed, in which the advantages expected from the proposed company were fully discussed by Messrs. Wm. Stewart, Neil McQuarrie, J. A. Brace, Richard Hunt, and others, all of whom expressed the opinion that a good paying business could be carried on by the company on the lines suggested and that the project would be of great benefit to Summerside and Prince County. A committee consisting of Messrs R. T. Holman, Neil McQuarrie, R. Hunt, Wm. Stewart, D. K. Currie and Hon. R. C. McLeod, was appointed to solicit stock for the company. The intention in reference to stock was that about half should be subscribed in Summerside and Prince County and the balance in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The lists were handed round and about \$3,000 stock was subscribed. Although not definitely settled it was suggested that about half the capital stock \$25,000 would be sufficient to enable the company to secure a suitable boat. The lists are being presented to the different business men throughout the town.

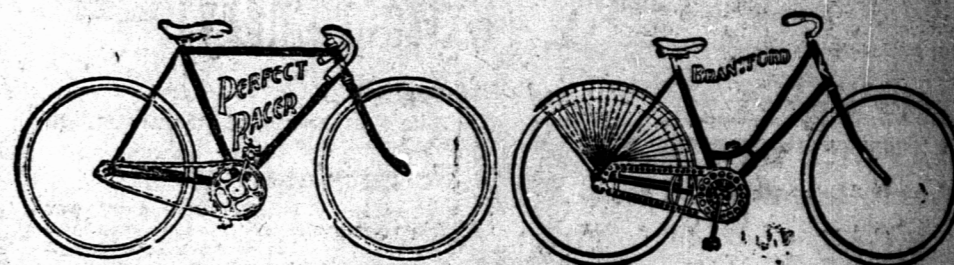

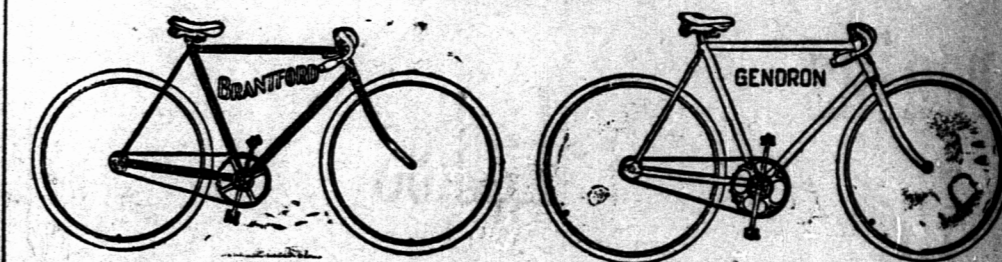
