The Rector, Rev. Dr. J. A. Murphy, left Thursday morning on a short business trip to Saint John.

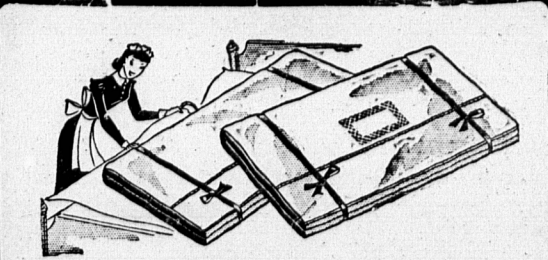

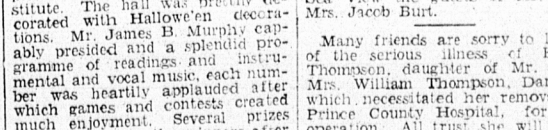
