TORONTO, Oct. 13.—With "The Church in the Household" was the general topic for consideration by the Ecumenical Methodist Conference in this city yesterday. The addresses included "Home Religion and Religious

Education in the Home," by Rev. W. B. Lark, of Bude, England; "Methods of Religious Training in the Home," by Rev. D. S. Bedford, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the United States; "The Family Altar," by Dr. Richard T. Smith, of London, England; "The Psychology of Child Training," by Rev. F. M. Hamill, Nashville, Tenn.; "The Widening Mission of the Sunday School," by Rev. C. E. Wilburg, of Pittsburgh, Pa.; and "The Equipment of the School Teacher," by Rev. J. H. Freeman, of the Wesleyan Reform Union.

The American and Canadian delegates, especially from the larger cities are getting much valuable data from the paper read by English delegates regarding methods in so-called slum work, and in practical application of the principles of Christian Socialism. Much of this information will be used in a preventative way.

According to Rev. George P. Eckman of St. Pauls Methodist Church, of New York, "One of the conspicuous needs of the day in our work is disinterested social service. The social settlement already is showing to the State its duty and to the church its opportunity."

FOR BIG PEACE UNION

Divorce, socialism, labor unions and wealth were discussed yesterday. The general topic in hand was "The Church and Social Service." A proposition was made in the form of a resolution presented by the business committee calling for the creation of what would be practically a world's welfare commission. Action in the matter was deferred, but the expectation is that before the close of the present conference there will be created a permanent international Methodist commission composed of fifty delegates from the eastern division and an equal number from the western, to gather information respecting the various Methodist churches and their problems, to promote closer union between them, to provide for the next ecumenical relations of the various branches of Methodism that the results of the conference may be conserved, and to forward

great moral causes, including the promotion of international peace. Sir Robert Perks, of London, England, said of the plan:—"Had such an alliance existed in the past, war might have been prevented in one or two instances. The influence for good of our thirty-three millions of Methodists, thus united, is beyond computation. It would be the greatest world power."

SCORES DIVORCE

Rev. Dr. Gross, Alexander, Nashville, Tenn., editor of the Methodist Review, asserted in his address on "The Social Teachings of Jesus," that there is "urgent need for more preachers like Dr. G. G. Richmond, of Philadelphia, who fearlessly exposed the iniquity of the recent marriage of a divorced millionaire. All honor to him, and equal honor to the poor Methodist preacher who flatly refused a fee of \$10,000 to perform the ceremony and declined a gift of another \$10,000 offered to him as a reward for doing his duty."

CHRISTIAN SOCIALISTS

Socialism, Christian and anti-Christian, was considered by Rev. B. Haddon, of Gateshead-On-Tyne, England. "There is a socialism," he said, "which denies God, ignores the Bible, trifles with family ties and sacrifices the individual to society. Such socialism can receive no quarter from the Christian. But this type is passing away. The leading socialists of today are Christians in spirit and purpose. Christian socialism demands a change in the outward conditions of men who live and conditions which are nothing less than a scandal to civilization."

The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the appointment of a general commission. Following was a general discussion of the topic of "The Church in the Household."

MCGILL STUDENTS WERE CENSURED

MONTREAL, October 10.—Describing their conduct as hooliganism and saying that justice could not be done because of the number concerned in the outrageous actions of the student body responsible for the disorder, Recorder Wier yesterday condemned Edward Lyon, 18 years of age, and Douglas McLeod, 19 years, students of McGill University, to pay a fine of five dollars between them for obstructing the sidewalk on October 3 and five dollars each for striking an officer in the discharge of his duty on the same day.

The young men were not allowed to hear this sentence without a severe admonition. "It is impossible to expect justice in this serious matter, where there are so many implicated, and it is with regret that judgment, adverse to that expected to be delivered to a student of McGill University, or of any other institution of learning, must be rendered by this court," said the recorder.

"I can describe their conduct no better than by calling it hooliganism. Such proceedings cannot be tolerated. The revered names of McGill and Laval will not protect you from the laws of the land."

"Students are supposed to be following in the laudable pursuit of knowledge, and not as in the case before me breaking the laws with impunity, terroring and frightening women and children, and attempting to take in their own hands the administering of the law as interpreted by the guardians of the peace for the whole city, for the benefit of all. I must say in conclusion that your conduct reflects no credit on anybody, and you ought to be ashamed of yourselves."

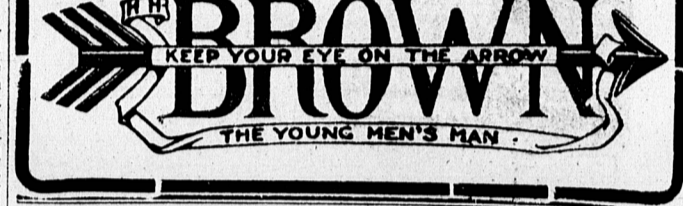
