Brings Hot Meal to Fliers



Flying men of the RCAF who guard convoys for long hours at sea in aircraft not provided with cooks' messes now can get hot meals as a result of a new metal food cabinet designed by the Air Force engineering and medical branches. The Flight Sergeant and Sergeant (shown above) are helping themselves to a tempting meal kept hot in the cabinet. The new is plugged into the aircraft electrical circuit and the food, prepared on the ground, can be kept hot indefinitely. As shown in the other picture, deep metal dishes carry the food and a removable grid prevents shifting of the containers. The thermos bottles hold the liquids, soup, tea or coffee. Two smaller boxes carry all the required foods that need not be heated. There is enough space for two complete meals for nine men. On long patrol flights or on other extended operations hot meals from the cabinet will ease strain and raise flagging spirits. — (RCAF Photo).

C. N. R. Moncton Blood Donors Ass'n

MONCTON, N. B. June 14 — At a meeting held in the city hall here last night an association to be known as the Canadian National Railway, Moncton, N. B. Blood Donors Association was formed comprised of Federal, National Employees volunteering their services to obtain blood donations for the Canadian Red Cross Society.

Mr. J. P. Johnston, regional vice president and general manager, addressed the meeting pointing out that although the response of employees in the past has been very good it was felt that organized effort would result in a great deal more blood being donated by members of the railway family.

With A. A. Beaucage, General Chairman of Federated Trades Atlantic Region as Vice Chairman representing labor and A. S. Gunn principal assistant engineer, vice chairman representing other employees R. M. Smith on the staff of the regional vice president and general manager was elected secretary. A representative was selected from each department of the railway. Moncton to act for the association in arranging for blood donations from the employees of that department.

At the close of the meeting Dr. C. R. Baxter one of the original organizers of the Canadian Red Cross Blood Donors Clinic at Moncton and representing the Moncton Medical Society also addressed the gathering stressing the great need for more blood donations at once as it took some time to process the blood and make it available for the troops on the fighting fronts.

Heavy Fines For Price Raising

Twenty three fines of \$1,000 a piece and four fines of \$500 a piece were imposed on the Empire Clothing Manufacturing Co., Montreal after Mr. John Ahern, K.C. counsel for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, represented by Judge Edouard Archambault that the number of items covered by the 27 charges laid against the company "runs into thousands" in each of which constitutes an offence. The company, through its counsel had pleaded guilty to the 27 charges involving sales of cloths by the yard and men's suits at above ceiling prices; failure to have prices established by the W. P. T. B., and like offences.
