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C. N. R. Hotel Selected By Sir Henry Thornton

Selection Of Knights Of Columbus Grounds Has
Been Made, Subject To Decision Of Railway
Board. Enthusiastic Welcome Of C. N. R. Pre-
sident At Summerside And Charlottetown. Full
Text Of Sir Henry's Address At Board Of
Trade Banquet Last Night.

A site for a Canadian National Hotel in Charlottetown will be acquired as quickly as circumstances permit, and construction will commence as soon as possible after the acquisition of the property, was the announcement made by Sir Henry Thornton, president and general manager of the Canadian National Railways, at a banquet tendered in his honor by the Charlottetown Board of Trade at the Beach Grove Inn last night. Sir Henry, who was accompanied by Mr. W. U. Appleton, general manager, Atlantic Region, and other railway officials, motored from Summerside yesterday afternoon. He received an enthusiastic welcome at last evening's banquet and his statement with reference to the new hotel was greeted with loud applause.

Later in the evening, the C. N. R. president announced to the press that subject to the approval of the Railway Board of Management the new hotel will be erected on the Knights

- The possibilities of Prince Edward Island as a tourist resort were stressed by Sir Henry in his remarks last night. He stated that the construction of the new car ferry would soon be under way, and that within a very few days tenders will be called.
- President H. F. MacPhee, who presided at last night's function, tendered a cordial welcome to Sir Henry and party on behalf of the Charlottetown Board of Trade. Short addresses of welcome were also made by Premier Saunders, His Worship Mayor Yeo, and Mr. Justice Arsenault. Following Sir Henry's speech, concluding remarks were made by Mr. Nelson Rattenbury and Dr. Smith, of New Brunswick, C. N. R. directors.
- Sir Henry's Address
"I am in a fair way of becoming spoiled," Sir Henry laughingly remarked as he rose to reply. "This is one of the most unique trips that I have ever undertaken since I have been in Canada, because upon all sides I have found satisfaction with the Railway; compliments which were so far as I was concerned, severe attacks upon my modesty; and an abundance of hospitality which also severely tasked my capacity."
"The Judge (Mr. Justice Arsenault) has not prepared a very accurate description of the events which took place when he and a number of other gentlemen from this district, shepherded by Mr. Rattenbury, called at my office to propose a Canadian National Railways hotel in Charlottetown. I might say that he approached the subject with all of the bravado, all of the courage and all of the self assurance which characterize judges when they are lecturing juries. (Laughter and applause). PARLIAMENT CONVENED YESTERDAY

The King Was Unable To Attend Owing to His Recent Long Illness.

LONDON, July 2.—Parliament, the sixth in the reign of King George V, convened shortly after noon today in the Chamber of the Lords and heard the speech from the throne read by Lord Chancellor Sankey. The King himself was unable to attend due to his recent long illness.

LONDON, July 2.—The formal opening of the new parliament today was quiet, even dull. The lords commissioners in scarlet and ermine robes lent a touch of color to the great chamber of the House of Lords but almost gone entirely were the glitter and circumstance of a state opening of parliament with the absence of His Majesty.

Not since 1900 the latter part of the reign of Queen Victoria had the British parliament been opened before by a lord commissioner.

The first king's speech in British history prepared by a Labor government was then read occupying just ten minutes.

A feature of it was the almost insistent way in which it was emphasized that the new government was working in consultation with the dominions.

It expressed the hope of securing in co-operation with the governments of the dominions of India and of foreign powers an early reduction on armaments.

The speech indicated wide schemes to find employment for slum clearance and for housing.

Re-organization of the coal industry is under consideration, not only the question of miners' hours but the possibility of the state acquiring some measure of control over the mines being considered.

CONSERVATIVE POLICY
LONDON, July 2.—Stanley Baldwin, the former Conservative prime minister, speaking in the debate on the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne this afternoon, declared that he and his friends would offer no factious opposition to the new government. They intended, he said, to assist His Majesty's government in being carried on, but demanded a certain amount of self control on both sides.

OTTAWA, July 2.—The Liberal party will not place a candidate in the field to contest the by-election in Lanark County to be held on July 29. This was announced today by Dr. E. H. Wicks, acting president of the Lanark County Liberal Association.

Reference has been made to some of the things which the Railway has undertaken to carry out, such as transportation facility for Prince Edward Island. The car ferry will soon be under way. Within a few days tenders will be called for and that vehicle of transportation will be provided.

"In this connection let me say that the Judge, in addition to being a famous advocate and well known Justice, is also one of the greatest little philanthropists that I have ever met. I am moved to that statement by the generosity with which he flung this problem of your communication with the Mainland on my door-step. (Laughter). That problem is rather more complicated and perhaps somewhat more difficult than is possible for the judicial mind to conceive. It involves a good many very important and serious engineering problems. But I am always willing to investigate anything; and that proposal is now under examination. Let me assure you, however, that it is not as simple a thing to solve as might appear on the surface.

"The standardization of the railway lines on the Island is proceeding apace, and with the standardization of the Murray Harbor line we shall have made a large improvement and advancement in the last six years. As the years have rolled by we have endeavored to improve the character of the track, and to bring the railway to a constantly improving standard of conditions that permits faster trains, better service

OTTAWA, July 2.—Details of the new regulations issued under the Root and Vegetables Act by Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture, show that they provide for new grades of potatoes, onions, celery and turnips. The new grades for potatoes are Canada no. 1, Canada no. 2, Canada no. 3, and Canada Fancy, the last being a grade intended to take care of potatoes for special trade such as hotels, baking and export.

Compulsory inspection is now provided for all carlot shipments of vegetables from any part of New Brunswick to any other part of Canada or for export. This was provided at the request of the potato growers and shippers of New Brunswick. Carlot shippers in that province must now register with the Dominion fruit commissioner and shippers will move under a government certificate of inspection at point of shipment. It is anticipated that as a result of this action an increased demand for potatoes from New Brunswick will develop on both export and provincial markets.

THE KING RETURNS TO LONDON

His Majesty Is Given a Tremendous Ovation As He Rode Through The Streets In An Open Carriage To Buckingham Palace.

LONDON, July 2.—Welcomed with echoing shouts of joy and tears of affection, the king, thin but bronzed returned to London today, signaling recovery from his long and dangerous illness. His Majesty, confident in renewed health and vigor, rested to-night again in Buckingham Palace whence he was borne in an ambulance five months ago to Bognor, Sussex, a pale and enfeebled man.

Uncounted thousands cheered the king wildly as he, the queen by his side, rode in an open stage carriage from Kensington through festively decked historic thoroughfares to the palace. He had been driven by motor car from Windsor Castle to Kensington where the change to the stage carriage was made.

Moving slowly through miles of packed humanity. His Majesty received with a quiet smile the cheers and fragrant flowers offered by his people, occasionally he waved his hand or swept his hat around in acknowledgment of the fervid shouts and waving flags. An ovation almost overpowering in its testimony of profound affection, was tendered His Majesty as he reached the palace at last. Here he returned a few solemn words of thankfulness.

"I wish to express my heartfelt gratitude," he said, from the palace balcony, "for the affectionate and enthusiastic welcome I have received on returning after long months of illness to the capital of my empire."

Then the king held up the baby Princess Elizabeth, daughter to the Duke and Duchess of York, to share the deafening plaudits of the multitude which pressed against the palace railings. The band and the tens of thousands joined in the national anthem, and other members of the royal family appeared with His Majesty on the balcony. Then the king turned back to greet the members of the royal household.

OTTAWA, July 2.—James Armstrong Richardson of Winnipeg, head of the grain firm of James Richardson and Sons, was this afternoon chosen as the new chancellor of Queen's University to succeed Sir Robert L. Borden who resigned several weeks ago. Mr. Richardson's name was the only one to be placed in nomination and he was unanimously chosen for the post.

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Montreal Choir In Delightful Concert

L'Association Chorale Give Splendid Programme Under The Distinguished Patronage Of His Honour The Lieut. Governor.

Those of our citizens who are appreciative of that which is finest in music had the pleasure last night of listening to one of the season's best concerts, which was given in the Prince Edward Theatre by L'Association Chorale St. Louis de France of Montreal.

Governor Hertz, and was sponsored by the Corpus Christi Choir of St. Dunstan's Basilica, was most enjoyable—the more so, as it was from the finest works, both sacred and secular. The chorus work throughout was splendid, seventy male voices blending richly together into an ensemble of most pleasing tone colour. In addition, their work was marked throughout by a high degree of technical finish—with of course, great precision of attack and a remarkable degree of flexibility in response to the baton of their talented director, M. Joseph Saucier.

It is difficult to select for praise any particular number—all from Saint Saen's "Saltarelle" to "O Canada" were very well done—but it seemed to this listener that perhaps the Chorus excelled in the liturgical Hymns "Ave Verum" and "Tantum Ergo," the musical settings to which were by Dubois and Mendelssohn respectively. The magnificent "Pilgrim's Chorus" from Wagner's Opera "Tannhauser" was also given a splendid rendition.

As to the soloists—Mlle. Lamoureux has a lovely coloratura soprano voice of great power and range, which was heard to advantage in the duet from "Lakme" and also in the celebrated sextette from "Lucie de Lamermoor," which was so enjoyed by the audience that it was repeated by special request. Her great-

est triumph was in an encore number, the Bell song from "Lakme"—a piece of great technical difficulty. Mlle. Bertha Cabana gave an excellent reading, in particular, of Massenet's "Song of Tears," and her encore number, "Hal-Lull" by Robin. M. M. Trotter and Fortin also sang ship also touched at many other the opportunity to visit Charlottetown in this delightful manner. The splendid singing of M. M. Cofsky and Saucier in the sextette, as also of M. M. Cofsky, Proulx, and Bertrand in the Gratias Agimus in Riga's "Gloria."

And last but not least, high praise must be given Mr. Antonio Letourneau and Mlle. Duplessis and Trotter, for the sympathetic accompaniments they supplied on the piano.

It will be recalled that this splendid choir visited this city two years ago, and it is the hope of all discriminating citizens that they may visit us again in the not too distant future.

The members of the Choir arrived in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon on the finely appointed steamship "St. Lawrence" of the Canada Steamship Lines. To a representative of The Guardian several stated that they had had a most enjoyable trip. This was in the form of an excursion, as, in addition to the seventy choristers, some four hundred others took advantage of splendidly, the former giving a particularly lovely rendition of the popular song "I'll sing thee songs of Araby," while M. Fortin's clear baritone did equal justice to Sanderson's "Until."

In the duet from the "Pearl Fishers" of Bizet, their voices, tenor and baritone, blended most delightfully. Mention must also be made of the
