POLICE COURT.—Saturday morning a prohibition case against Raymond Flood, Sydney Street, was dismissed by the Stipendiary Magistrate. A prohibition case against Henry Cahill, Sydney Street, was adjourned. The adjourned case against a young woman for neglecting to obtain assistance during childbirth was heard. Evidence of two ladies of the Salvation Army who accompanied the accused to a doctor was taken, also the evidence of two doctors. The Attorney General appeared for the prosecution. Mr. Inman, K. C., for the defense. The hearing was not open to the public. At the close the Magistrate sent the girl up to the Supreme Court.

AN "ORGAN" OUT OF TUNE.—In publishing an article which has been sent for publication to all the Island newspapers, the P. E. Island Agriculturist, in its issue of last Saturday, states that it does so "as the official organ of the Potato Growers Association." This claim is refuted by Mr. Wilfred Boulter, secretary of the Association. The Potato Growers, while feeling indebted to the Island newspapers generally for the generous publicity given their activities at all times, recognize no "official organ." They have received, he said, much wider publicity through the Charlottetown press than through any "organ" in Summerside, but this claim has never been advanced either by the Guardian or the Patriot.

AYRSHIRE DEMONSTRATION.—A very profitable afternoon was spent at Mr. T. A. Rodd's, Milton, on March 27th in the form of a demonstration on breeding, judging and feeding dairy cattle. The attendance was not large owing to the weather and another attraction in the vicinity falling on the same day. A judging class of milk cows picked from Mr. Rodd's splendid herd proved quite interesting and instructive. Afterwards feeds and feeding were discussed. Mr. Reid of the Prov. Dept. of Agriculture who took charge of this class, also made some remarks on feeding the dairy cow. Mr. B. R. Brown outlined some of the activities of the Ayrshire Breeders' Club since it was organized, showing the advancement made with regard to B. testing. The club is now asking the Health of Animals Branch to take steps to establish a disease free area of P. E. I. which would be a great boon to Island stock. Mr. Brown also spoke on feeding the dairy cow and emphasized the need of beginning with the calf. Mr. Peterson of the Dom. Dept. of Agriculture advised Ayrshire breeders to get behind the club and push. He stated that in his experience the sections in general that seem to be thriving the best, have organizations such as this. A move was made toward trying to get a better Live Stock Train for P. E. I. such as are being operated in some of the other provinces, and which are proving to be quite successful. It is hoped that the different live stock societies will co-operate in this matter. A hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Rodd for the use of his farm and herd for this demonstration brought the meeting to a close. (Patriot please copy.)

they had made application to the Council? He would move that this subject be struck out.
MR. McEWEN spoke about a full page advertisement that appeared in some magazine regarding a mining proposition in Colorado. The people read it and were floored. He did not want any restrictions on the newspapers if they published what was right.
MR. McLURE: There is no restriction against such a thing in this Act. If the promoter wants to control what the people read he must get an act in force prohibiting every magazine, periodical and news paper from coming into the Province. You are only limiting, by this clause, the work that may come to the publisher here. Why should he be discriminated against? The printer should be able to judge for himself, with his experience, what advertising he publishes.
MR. McARTHUR: It is certainly a discrimination against local newspapers. But if people with stock to offer are alive to their interests, they will find that out, and they will not advertise unless they are sure of getting the consent of the Council. If these advertisements are in other papers in other Provinces it is a little arbitrary to prohibit their publication here.
MR. J. AUGUSTINE McDONALD: Suppose a telegram comes asking for three insertions in one daily paper, the publishers may not have time to approach the Council. How are they going to find out what to do? The company may be in United States or Mexico. It is placing a burden on them which they cannot carry out. I do not think the idea is workable.
MR. McEWEN: I do not think the newspapers would like to publish anything that would be detrimental to the interests of the Province, but they might do it innocently.
The subsection was deleted by unanimous vote.

A number of other clauses were held over. Clause 10 provides that the certificates granted by the Council shall recite in bold type that the Council in no wise recommends the said securities to the public. The Council shall examine all statements and documents filed, and if deemed advisable shall cause to be made a detailed examination of the company's affairs, at the expense of the company. If the Council find "a fair, just and equitable plan for the transaction of business" they shall issue the certificate.

MR. McLURE: This is where the whole work of the Council is going to come in. On what basis are they going to judge of the affairs of any company? I would like to have the promoter of the bill fully explain this part of it. Will they have some experienced financial man go into the details of the companies making application?

MR. McEWEN: In the first place, the Council does not recommend any company.

MR. McLURE: They have got to say whether a proposition is good or bad.

MR. McEWEN: No, not even that. They are permitted to do business on the basis of what they have said. If the company is solvent and its affairs in good condition it gets a certificate.

Sale of Securities Bill

(Continued from Page 2)

MR. McEWEN: The Council, MR. McLURE: What is the use of giving people a license if you do not know whether they are good or bad? Are you not putting your stamp of approval on every proposition, no matter in what way it is looked at? You must say whether a company is solvent or otherwise. If the proposition is not a good one you are supposed not to give them a license. You must say one thing or the other.

HON. J. A. McDONALD: The Council will have to consider the matter as well as it can. When it gives a certificate to a company it does not commit itself, but if it finds that the stock is bad it does not give the certificate at all. That is the merit of the bill, it prevents wildcat schemes from operating once in a while.

MR. McLURE: That is my argument, exactly.

MR. SAUNDERS: When the people buy they know pretty well what they are doing. I would like to know how much more wisdom the Council has than the average buyer.

MR. McEWEN: We are not dealing with the average buyer; we are dealing with the "lamb" that are liable to be shorn. The ordinary man is able to take care of himself. How would you know about any company except by their own statement? The Council are supposed to be pretty wise. They will use their business judgment and that will go as far as to protect the people most liable to be "skinned."

HON. MR. MYERS: I was just wondering how much these poor fellows would know after you gave this certificate of approval and then accompanied it with this notice in clause 12, drawing attention to the fact that you don't know whether the proposition is good or bad, after all.

PREMIER STEWART: If desirable, another body other than the Executive Council could be appointed. We might constitute a committee of retired bankers, for instance.

MR. McEWEN: We could appoint a Public Utilities commission, if we liked; that matter could be easily disposed of; the Council was just suggested for the time being.

MR. McLURE: I am not deprecating in any way the wisdom of the Council; their work is heavy enough today and there is a great deal of work in connection with this that I do not think we should expect the Council to do. The consequence is that we are bringing in legislation that we are not going to get carried out. It will be legislation without administration. I do not believe the Act will be workable in this Province; clause after clause it seems to be more impracticable.

MR. DENNIS believed Mr. McLure had struck the key note. Could the promoter give his own opinion as to what time it would take the Council to decide on the merits of a company with for instance, a mining proposition in British Columbia, that should be bought, if it was good, as quickly as possible? He did not think the Council could decide in less than three months, especially if there were six or eight companies making application at the same time, as would be likely. Information would have to be got from all over Canada and United States. We know the Executive Council is already over-worked. The matter could only be decided at a meeting of the Council, and as a rule these meetings take place about once a month. The matter would have to be suspended and the company writes

to, and perhaps, at the beginning of the year, the license would be granted, after all the stock was sold.

MR. McEWEN: I think my hon. friend is having a little bit of fun down there in his own corner. My opinion of mining stock in British Columbia offered down here is that it would be well to take fifty years to consider it (Laughter).

MR. SAUNDERS: I think we had better put the promoter as chairman of the Council. (Laughter.)

The clause carried.

Clause 11 (section 4) exempts by permission of the Council all cooperative associations allowing no commission on the sale of their shares, etc.

MR. DENNIS asked if this applied to cheese and butter factories.

MR. McEWEN said these were exempt under the act.

Clause 11 referred also to the provision that notice accompany certificates issued by the Council, advising that the Council "in no wise recommends the stocks, etc."

All the sections of this clause were allowed to stand for further consideration.

Clause 12 reads in part: Whenever it appears to the Council that the assets of a company are impaired to the extent that they do not equal its liabilities, or that it is conducting its business in an unsafe, inequitable or unwise manner, or is jeopardizing the interests of its stockholders etc., in shares, etc., or whenever such company fails or refuses to file papers, etc., or reneges by this Act, or when the company or any person in its behalf has published any advertisement, etc., which in the opinion of the Council is unfair or misleading, the Council may revoke the license.

MR. J. AUGUSTINE McDONALD thought this placed a heavy responsibility on the company.

MR. SAUNDERS did not see any sense in the clause at all. If a company continues business here for five or six years, is there to be a continuous inquiry from year to year into its affairs? That would never work.

MR. McEWEN said the clause referred more to a company previously doing business than to a new company. If the Council have suspicions that an old company is going downhill, they have a right to withdraw the license.

MR. McLURE: I take the same objections to this clause as to the others. It is putting a great deal of extra work on the Executive Council. It is the same work that is done by the Toronto Saturday Night or some great financial paper, and even then, with the advantages they have of looking into the affairs of big companies, it took all the wise men of Canada to find out that the assets of the Home Bank were not what they should have been. Now we are going to place this burden on the Provincial Council to look into the condition of all companies, new and old. They will have time to do nothing else. This clause is not of any importance to the act and I would move that it be struck out entirely.

HON. MR. ARSENAULT said mention had rightly been made of the great responsibility the proposed legislation would impose on the Council members. They are not rich men, and however upright they might be, this would induce people, though knowing that the Council could not guarantee their stock in any case, to try to persuade them to issue certificates in perhaps doubtful cases. The enforcement of the act might not be any safer in the hands of financial men, but it would do away with any suspicion that might attach to the performance of the duty. The opinion of experienced financial men would most likely be considered as the safest guide. Yet even the most intelligent financiers might make mistakes. Even the hon. member from Summerside (Mr. McArthur) said he had lost \$1,000 in some unwise investment.

MR. McARTHUR: No, I didn't lose it; I passed it on to somebody else.

The motion that the clause be struck out carried unanimously.

Clause 13 provides that the affairs of a Company when considered unsafe by the Council, may be wound up upon application to the Court, and the company put out of business.

MR. J. AUGUSTINE McDONALD: Are we not interfering with the Bankruptcy Act if we do this? There is no authority for the Attorney General to act under the Bankruptcy Law and it is just a question whether we are not transgressing on Dominion rights.

The clause was allowed to stand over. Progress was reported on the bill and leave asked to sit again.
