FOOD PROBLEM IN PETROGRAD IS REPORTED URGENT

LONDON, March 9.—The Russian government has called a special conference to meet immediately to deal with the food problem in Petrograd, which is said to be extremely urgent according to a Reuter's despatch from the Russian capital. The members of the conference will include the premier, the ministers of war, communications, commerce and agriculture, the mayor of Petrograd and representatives of the Duma, the council of the empire and the Zemstvo assemblies.

He had been up and around every day attending to the work about the farm until the day of his death which came suddenly and unexpectedly. He took a great interest in school matters and was for many years one of the trustees of Port Hill School. He was a man who gave freely of his time in helping along everything that was for the advancement of the community. 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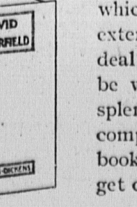
