King and Hoover

In his remarks on the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne the Conservative leader, Mr. Bennett, described the King Government as a do-nothing government. The description suggests an exchange may not be altogether original, but the words are the most expressive and applicable that could be used.

Mr. King has been at the head of the government of this country for nine years. He appointed a Commission, headed by Sir Andrew Ross Duncan, of England, to define for him what Maritime Rights were, promising to implement the Commission's recommendations by legislative enactment. He has done so only partially and will be called upon during this session to explain why he has not done so in full. Then Mr. King appointed a Tariff Advisory Board, which has been taking evidence in such weighty matters as the importation of frozen rabbits for fox meat and materials entering into the manufacture of anti-freeze for automobile radiators. In introducing tariff changes at the last session of Parliament the Finance Minister said the changes were not based on any recommendations of the Advisory Board and admitted that he had not even read the volumes of evidence taken.

On Tuesday the 4th of March, 1930 was just one year since Mr. Hoover was inaugurated as President of the United States and with his chosen colleagues took over the administration of the affairs of the neighboring republic. The position of President of the United States corresponds with that of Premier of Canada and in the year that has elapsed since his inauguration Mr. Hoover has done some things. A special session of Congress, called for the purpose, has created a fund of \$500,000,000 for farm relief and the marketing of farm products—not all, of course, to be spent in one year. Fifteen million dollars has been appropriated for new hospitals for disabled war veterans and there is a recommendation to add thirty million dollars a year to the grant to assist the different states in highway work. The debt has been reduced by seven hundred million dollars out of revenue while the nation's taxes have been reduced by another one hundred and sixty million dollars out of the remaining surplus. Then the President called together all the business, industrial and railway heads, with the Governors of States and Mayors of cities to guard against depression and unemployment which seemed likely to follow several years of unparallelled expansion and reckless speculation, with the result that he received pledges aggregating ten thousand million dollars for construction and maintenance work throughout the country.

WANTED—MONTREAL, May 13—There were 60 cattle, 1770 calves, 568 hogs and 34 sheep and lambs, for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. The cattle market was steady. Cows were sold for \$6 to \$7.50 and bulls around \$7 to \$7.50. Calves were 75 cents to \$1 lower, trade was drabgy, prices ranged from \$5 to \$7.50. Two lots of the best cows brought \$7.50 and the bulk of the sales were made between \$5.75 and \$6.50. About 600 calves not sold early today. Sheep were mostly \$7 and spring lambs around \$7 each.

On one market where only 80 hogs were offered sales were made at \$13 to \$13.25. On the other market two cars were held at \$12.75 flat. The balance of the pigs were not sold early today.

POLITICAL POT

than in 25 the surety of a Federal vote and of a general election on the merits of the Baxter Government in New Brunswick are already having their repercussions in headquarters offices of both parties.

From 1925 to 1928 there was no lack of political interest along the Maritime front. The 1928 Federal election, the provincial turnover to the Liberal fold in Prince Edward Island in the following year, and the Rhodes administration's second victory in Nova Scotia provided an annual battle. But the past two years, with the exception of a by-election in Halifax, have constituted what amounts to a closed season on the ballot.

Good-bye to all that. The party flags are up. Already in New Brunswick the Liberal party has chosen a new leader, in preparation for the provincial contest, and in succession to A. A. Dysart, who declined to accept re-appointment to the post. The new leader Wendell P. Jones, K. C., of Woodstock, is a veteran in the field, having served from 1903 to 1908 in the legislative assembly of his province. At one time he was solicitor general.

Nominations for the New Brunswick election are already pouring in. In Nova Scotia, too, although no provincial election is impending, the Liberal opposition will assemble under new leadership at the next session of the House. After thirty-five years of public life, in the course of which he has successfully contested three elections for the Federal House and four for the Nova Scotia Assembly Hon. William Chisholm, his health no longer robust, will leave the affairs of the party to a leader who will be named at a provincial convention in June.

Up to the present, one nomination only for the Federal contest has been made in the Maritimes, when J. M. Wallace, Mayor of Yarmouth, was endorsed to contest that constituency at present represented by the Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defense.

A survey of the situation shows that of the twenty-nine Federal representatives from the Maritimes, eighteen are of the Conservative faith eleven professing Liberal beliefs.
