Charlotteville gave the largest amount in prizes and was the only track to give money premiums to leading drivers and groomers.

The Grim Reaper took away during the year, several who had been prominent figures in turf circles.

Among the horses imported since last racing season were The Great Guy 2:04 1/4 and Maribell 2:14 1/2.

Heartiest congratulations to Gordon Dawson, Summerside, on the attainment of his 72nd birthday.

The initial number is a bright, sparkling one with excellent cuts, very readable articles and short, pithy news of the equine world.

The performance of Calumet Evelyn in pacing off a winning record of 1:59 1/4 and four days later trotting in 2:00, has so intrigued the writer that everything pertaining to her is the subject of careful thought.

Leta Kalmuck, owned and driven by Willard Kelly, Southport, P.E.I., the fastest three-year-old pacer of the year as well as being Maritime bred.

June Worthing, owned and driven by Wellington McNeill, Southport, was the fastest Maritime bred trotter of that age, winning in 2:22.

Abner T. Clegg, 2:04 1/2, owned by Frank Adams, Halifax, and driven by Billy Keyes, was the fastest four-year-old of the season.

Paddy Aubrey 2:17 1/4, owned by Harry O'Brien, Alberton, was the fastest four-year-old gelding bred in the province.

The fastest mile of the season was made by Betty S. 2:07, owned by C. M. Alexander, Saint John, when, driven by E. B. Avery, she won the Junior Free-For-All at Fredericton in 2:07 1/4.

The noted campaigner Marjorie M. 2:07 3/4, owned by Richard Jabble, was the second fastest of the year, winning the first heat of the Free-For-All at Woodstock in 2:07 3/4.

Calumet Bee, owned by Wellington McNeill, Southport, P.E.I., winner of six races, trotted the fastest mile of the season in a record time of 2:11 at Fredericton, winning in 2:11 3/4, 2:11, 2:11 1/2, the three fastest heats trotted in the Provinces during the season.

Alan Harvester 2:07, owned and driven by E. B. Avery, Woodstock, was the fastest trotting gelding owned in the Province when he won in 2:11 1/4 at Charlottetown.

Lusty Frisco, 2:07 1/4, owned by Charles Chandler, Charlottetown, piloted by Tom Holmes lowered the track trotting record at Alberton, P.E.I., to 2:12, and was the fastest trotting stallion of the year owned in the Provinces.

Among the Maritime Provinces breds, Peggy Longest, owned and driven by Frank Calbeck, Summerside, was the fastest trotting mare, winning in 2:16 at Alberton.

Peter Onward, owned by George Matthew, Campbellton, N.B., and driven by Morrison, was the fastest New Maritime Province bred performer of the season with his mile in 2:13 3/4 at Woodstock.

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One by one the turf journals have ceased publication. Household names like The Horse Review, The Trotter and Pacer, The American Sportsman, have gone to the limbo of lost publications.

The Editor is Walter Moore, one of the best known names in the harness scribe world, who represented the Horse Review of Chicago in New York for many years.

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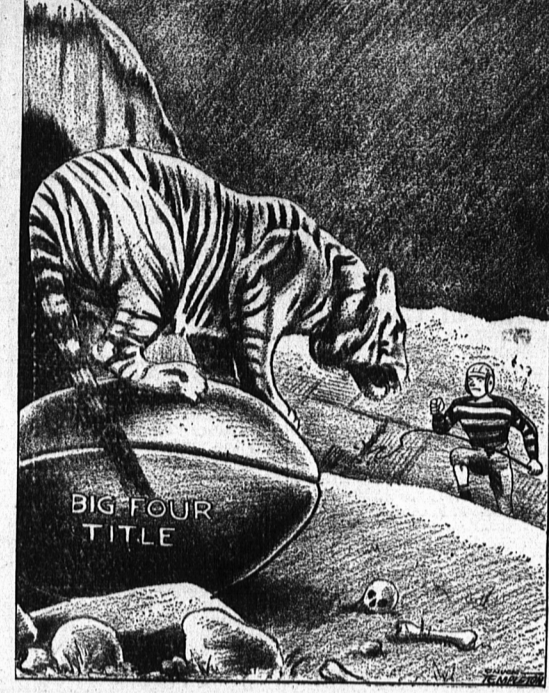

Down The Alleys

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Saints Outplay P. W. C. Squad To Win Third Game Of Series 8-3

Outplaying their opponents throughout the game with the exception of the last ten minutes of play, second St. Dunstan's football team forced the intercollegiate series to a fourth contest yesterday when they defeated the Prince of Wales fifteen 8 to 3 on the University gridiron.

Despite the adverse weather the two squads put up a good battle. Saints having the advantage in weight heeled the ball most continually, keeping the fast P.W.C. backs on the defensive and giving them no chance to break away as they did in the previous encounter.

Saints took full advantage of this superiority and their backfield came through with smart passing attacks that invariably carried the ball to within striking distance of a try.

J. A. McDonald was the spearhead of many Saints attacks. In addition to scoring both his team's tries he came through with some timely kicking while on the defensive. Ganeau, their fullback, was again a dangerous threat while O'Brien, Ronald McKinnon, Ayers and Connolly were also effective.

Jordan and Bulman, husky P. W. C. forwards, were the stars of the city team and on more than one occasion proved mighty troublemakers to the Red and White team.

Prince of Wales after kicking off had the first scoring opportunity of the game when Irlam, following a penalty kick was stopped just five yards from the line but Ganeau and McKinnon relieved the pressure with two timely boots.

Faced with a 5-0 deficit P.W.C. began to force matters and in a series of kicks and passing plays brought the play inside their opponents' twenty-five yard line.

After on a succeeding play being taken down from behind five yards short of the line, the half ended with the ball in the scrum.

For the first fifteen minutes of the second half play was continually inside the P.W.C. 25 yard marker. Saints seemed to be on the verge of adding to their score several times only to have penalty kicks called against them for handling the ball on the scrum.

It was not until the last ten minutes of the game that P.W.C. could hit their real stride. Play as usual was inside their defensive zone when they started an advance that led to their touchdown.

They kicked and ran their way to the Saints ten yard line and here Bulman receiving a pass plunged across the marker. The kick for the then tying points was short of the uprights.

Saints however took less than five minutes to get the points back.
