Liberal "Bluff"

The people are not believing all they see in the Liberal papers these days, Mr. McEwen said. They are thinking for themselves, and they are judging the parties on their past records. Go back as far as 1891 and you will find that the Liberals in power, they had deficits every year. They ran a game of bluff for twenty years and put it all over this province. At every election they would say there was money for us at Ottawa; just put them back into office and they would get it.

West Indies Treaty

The business people of the West Indies are pretty shrewd gentlemen, and they "put it over" Mr. Logan, Mr. McEwen had stated in the House before that he did not believe any reputable company would tender for the service to that end of the world. He said that the Government got no tenders, people from Jamaica, Trinidad and other smaller islands went up to Ottawa and told wonderful stories about trade opportunities down there. They made a bargain with the Federal Government and received a grant of \$100,000 to put a banana line across the West Indies.

Another "Bluff" Called

The Leader of the Opposition said last night that he had kicked about the profits from the sale of liquor under the Bell Government, and he undertook to show the House, from the Bell reports, that he had done this prior to 1923. He had not yet produced that report. Mr. SAUNDERS: You will see it in The Patriot today.

The Root of the Trouble

"In my opinion, to strike to the root of the trouble you will have to prohibit the importation of liquor altogether. But the Dominion Government does not want to do that. Why? Because they want the \$17 or \$18 a case and the \$8 or \$9 a gallon duty on rum. They want that to run the country. To my mind that is the first thing to be attended to if the people want absolute Prohibition. (Applause.) Not to put a duty at all on liquor, but to prohibit the stuff altogether. Then you will have some face to talk Prohibition."

A Challenge to Mr. Saunders

Now about the statements made regarding this wonderful trip to the West Indies. The Leader of the Opposition made the statement on one occasion that if the Government wanted information about the West Indies, Mr. Logan could give them more information in one hour (or one week) than Mr. McEwen could give in ten years. Mr. McEwen would just submit a little challenge to the hon. member on that subject. He held in his hand a printed report of his visit to the West Indies, and of the trade conditions there. Let three disinterested men be appointed to examine it; let the Leader of the Opposition appoint one; Mr. McEwen would appoint one, and let those two men appoint a third interested party. Let them compare Mr. McEwen's report with Mr. Logan's.

Logan's. And if they do not decide that Mr. McEwen's report is more than twice as much practical information as the West Indies report, Mr. McEwen would give \$500 to the hospital of Charlottetown provided the Leader of the Opposition would forfeit the same amount if the decision went against the Logan report. (Applause.)

Mr. Saunders in replying, Hon. Mr. Logan again challenged him to take the offer up if he dared. It was all very fine, in the heat of an election campaign, to poke fun at a man in his absence, and insinuate that he had been given a free trip to the South because he was not about getting the position of Minister of Public Works. It was another thing when it came to back up those insinuations. Mr. McEwen had never applied for that portfolio in the Government, and if he was asked to take it tomorrow he would refuse, because it is worth \$2,000 a year, because it is worth the money. He belonged to a family that had never fed at the public trough of the country. He had been asked by the Minister of Agriculture if he would go to the West Indies, because at every campaign meeting in the country for some time previous this question of trade opportunities in the West Indies was talked about by the Liberal speakers. Mr. McEwen thought, at the time, that there was something in this talk, but when he went to the West Indies he saw conditions there, he changed his mind completely. He accepted the offer of the Minister of Agriculture, however, on the condition that his expenses would be paid. He charged nothing for his own services. He could tell the Leader of the Opposition now that if he would not take the same trip again if they did him as much as was paid by the Liberals to a certain gentleman for going down to Sydney, C. B.—\$12.00 a day and \$5.00 a day to feed him. If the Leader of the Opposition knows anything like that trip it is no fun at all, and it is not the comfort of the steamer service, getting ashore at the islands in the little boats as best you can, and spending your time interviewing business people and looking up trade reports. Mr. Logan said that the cost of the trip was as much as his report is not half as comprehensive.

Prohibition

The hon. member from the First District of Prince (Mr. Blanchard) talked a long while about Prohibition, and he left the House when he had finished. He must have got sick. Mr. McEwen regretted he was not in his seat, he would like to put a question to the gentleman. He gave a very good temperance lecture, but his remarks were wide of the mark. There is not a man on this side of the House who would want to open the flood-gates wider than they are in this province. Every one is agreed about the evils of intemperance; but the Government is not keeping their heads buried in the sand and imagining that everything is all right when it is not.

Party Records Compared

They also put in their platform about the fishermen—they were going to send an expert among the fishermen to instruct in the best methods of catching, drying and marketing fish, and hold short courses in the fishing centres. Returned soldiers were to receive the like training and financial assistance, and so forth. Did they do that? I really cannot understand how the Opposition members can hold up their heads and face the people of this country. Yet they apparently are basing their arguments on the record of the Bell Government! If you had a man in your employ whom you found was unreliable and was misrepresenting the Government, would you not discharge him and employ another man whom you could trust? And if you found the second man always reliable, always faithful to his promise, would you take the old fellow back again? I think not. That is the position. When the parties line up at the next election we will have one party whose record is one of broken promises. We will have the present Government with a record of every promise fulfilled and of statesmanlike administration. The record of the present Government is one to be proud of. They have tried to belittle as much as they like the efforts of the Premier in getting our increased subsidy, but it will not go down. The people know different. I have no doubt that when this inter-provincial Conference takes place at Ottawa, and when the facts are all laid out, they will get a much more; and we are entitled to that. We have a clear case and we have the unanimity of three Maritime Premiers working together to get results.

Mr. McEwen in Conclusion

Mr. McEwen in conclusion painted a bright picture of our possibilities in the future. We have made the Province a disease-free area for cattle. Let us make it a disease-free country for our people. That will be the strongest inducement to people coming here. If our young people only knew the disadvantages and the misery prevailing in many of the larger centres of the continent they would be more appreciative of conditions in P. E. Island. There is no better part of America than this little province. There are certainly no people like our own people. We have the good old stock here that can be relied on. Conservatives and Liberals should join in working for the good of the province. The little question of who has the reins of power is only a small thing after all. We want to make this country what it should be—the best place in America to live in, with all the modern conveniences possible. One of these improvements, Mr. McEwen believed, will be the harnessing of our rivers, which are capable of giving us at least 3,000 horse power.

Mr. McEwen Concluded

Mr. McEwen concluded with a loud applause. He was followed by the Budget debate by Mr. J. M. Donald.
