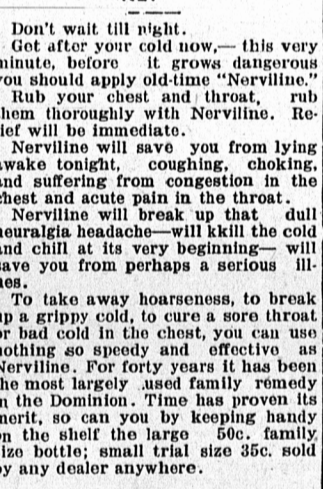
...SCHOOL WORK—The Fortune Head School District held their examination on Friday, Dec. 24th. It was largely attended by the people of the district. The school-room was beautifully decorated for the occasion with evergreens. The pupils were examined in the various classes by their teacher, Miss Frances Matheson, and the trustees. Their ready answers proved to show the creditable work they were doing. The evening was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem, after which all departed feeling well-pleased in having secured the service of such an excellent teacher.

**WHAT IS WINE**  
Following a public hearing on the question of what constitutes wine, the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States has promulgated a decision which prohibits the use of the name "wine" on products made by the addition of water to the juice, pomace, or pulp of grapes.  
The new ruling defines wine to be "the product of the normal alcoholic fermentation of the juice of fresh, sound, ripe grapes, with the usual cellar treatment."  
This action is taken, in the language of the decision, because "the Department of Agriculture has concluded that gross deception have been practiced" under former rulings. Food Inspection Decision 120 permitted certain classes of wine manufacturers to add water and sugar to the pomace or pulp of grapes from which the juice had been partially expressed, and then, after allowing the mixture to ferment, to call the beverage "pomace wine." Such products must now be called "imitation wine."

**SMITH-DORRIEN**  
Smith-Dorrien's characteristic cheerfulness was invaluable to the morale of our troops in the dark days at the beginning of our campaign in France. "Smith-Dorrien's smiling," our men used to say, "so that things can't be so bad." It is not generally known that Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien has four brothers also serving their country—two in the army and two in the navy. One brother reverses the order of the family names. Someone asked "Sir Horace the reason of this, and he replied, "I suppose the family was not quite sure in which order the names came so rang the changes on them so that at least one branch might be correct."

**SAVE THE BY-PRODUCTS**  
The fats from the various kinds of meat are the most valuable by-product of the kitchen if isolated from each other. Dumped carelessly into a common pot they are fit only for the soap pot. Divided they will contribute to the saving of money. One spoonful of grease which has been kept in a pot by itself and thereby retained its own flavor will do the work of five spoonfuls of butter.  
If drippings make excellent pie crust if they are beaten to a light cream and a squeeze of lemon juice and a half a teaspoonful of baking powder is added. Poultry fat is just the thing for spice cakes and cookies, and oysters fried in a pan of hot chicken grease, in which a slice of bacon has been fried, are most delicious.

**SWAGGER STICKS OF THE SOLDIERS**  
The army swagger cane has attained to a new importance since the war. Even civilians carry them, upon occasion; hoping perhaps, to be mistaken for soldiers in uniform. There is a certain amount of swagger cane, which is in effect a part and parcel of his uniform outfit, and which is discarded when it is discarded. The swagger, in its present form at all events, is a comparatively modern innovation. The soldiers have affected a short cane when "walking out" almost from time immemorial. But whereas in the old days, such canes were of all sorts and sizes according to the whim of the carrier, they are now of a uniform pattern for the whole British army; though differing in detail for each branch of the service, and also as regards most regiments.  
Riflemen, for instance carry a black ebony cane with a silver top. Ordinary line corps affect a kind of malacca, also with a silver top, on which is engraved the regimental crest or badge.  
The artillery sport a whangee or Japanese cane; and so on.  
All these various swaggers are practically of one size, measuring in length from the armpit to the tips of the fingers of an ordinary average built Tommy; while their girth is about equal to that of a substantial fountain pen. The canes are not cheap and the soldier has to pay for them out of his own pocket. Consequently, in order to minimize the risk of loss, he usually has his regimental number stamped on the rim of the metal top. This is done by the armorer-sergeant, to whom, in most regiments, is allotted the monopoly of

In most battalions, in time of peace, a "stick parade," (otherwise saluting drill), is held once a month. The men march in sections of fours past the lieutenant, saluting with the right hand as they go by, and bringing the cane to the left shoulder, upright, and parallel with body, knob uppermost.
