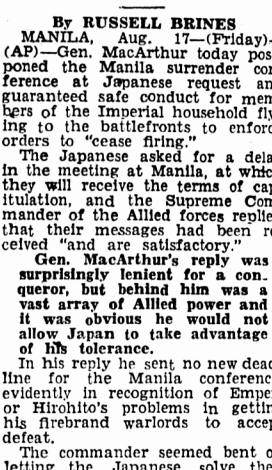

OTTAWA, Aug. 16 (CP)—Munitions Minister Howe stated Friday today that there will be no unemployment in Canada during the reconversion period if the people accept the jobs that will be available. Speaking at a press conference in the Parliamentary Press Gallery, Mr. Howe said that despite war production cutbacks there still is a great labor shortage particularly in basic industries which people left to take high-priced war jobs.
