LARGE COLLECTION.—Rev. J. S. Bonnell, minister of St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, St. John, announced to a large congregation on Sunday night the result of the appeal which he had made on a previous Sunday for a special offering towards defraying the debt on the Presbyterian Church in Canada and helping the missionary situation. He stated that one thousand dollars had been received on Sunday, Nov. 9th and that this was the largest local collection for Missions ever taken up on a single Sunday in the one hundred and forty years of St. Andrew's history.

PREMIER STEWART IN TORONTO.—Hon. J. D. Stewart, Prime Minister of Prince Edward Island arrived in the city last night from Ottawa, and is at the King Edward Hotel. While in Ottawa Hon. Mr. Stewart was induced to come to Toronto and attend the conference of the Liberal-Conservative Association which will be held Monday and Tuesday. When he left last night, Mr. Stewart said he was glad to avail himself of the privilege of conveying to the Conservatives of Ontario the greetings of the Conservatives from Prince Edward Island. He said the party in the far eastern island was never in better shape than during the past couple of years. (Toronto Mail and Empire)

Critical Situation

The break was immediately due, however, to Japanese resentment over the statement made yesterday by Sir Malcolm Delevingne, the British delegate, that Great Britain could not habitually recognize import certificates because of scandalous cases which involved high officials in one Far Eastern country "which he preferred not to name." The British position was that despite regularly issued import papers, opium and other narcotic drugs often were diverted on the way to the country of purchase and forwarded to other destinations where they were used for illicit gain, thus bringing a stain on the name of Great Britain which permitted the export.

The Japanese contended that when they tried to ship opium at Hong Kong the British authorities interfered and prevented re-exportation. They claimed this was an attack on Japanese good faith which could not be tolerated. Today Sir Malcolm Delevingne insisted on Great Britain's right to investigate all opium exportations, even if they were accompanied by official certificates. Publicly admitting that it was Japanese officials who were implicated in the opium scandals, Mr. Sugimura, the chief Japanese delegate, today, amid tense silence.

Splendid Capital For India's Millions Nears Completion

(United Press.) LONDON, Nov. 17.—Despite unforeseen obstacles and many delays incident to the great war, the work of rearing the new Indian capital at Delhi has gone steadily on, and latest reports to the India Office indicate that the first of the new buildings will be occupied by the end of next year. Thus will be realized one of the greatest building achievements of modern times. The new Indian capital is rising from a desolate and barren waste. The present English monarch, as king-emperor at his coronation durbar in 1912, announced the decision to transfer the capital of India from Calcutta to Delhi, not the old city of that name, but an entirely new municipality to rise from a reclaimed desert outside and beyond the older settlement. It was in 1913 that the town planning committee reported in favor of the so-called Raisini site, beyond old Delhi. Although the intervening years of war and reconstruction have doubled the expense of the original project, which will cost at least \$45,000,000 and many more millions in years to come, the work has never once been suspended since it was started.

The principal architect of the new Delhi is Sir Edwin Lutyens, who plans to make it his crowning achievement. Associated with Sir Edwin is Herbert Baker and a score of lesser famous architects. Sir Edwin Lutyens himself is the architect of the government house, the central building of the whole scheme, which will contain among other official quarters the state residence of the Viceroy. It is now promised that this building will be ready for occupancy late in 1926. Brick and white marble are the materials used in constructing the new Delhi. Architecturally the style is classical, with skillful blending and adaptation of oriental domes, minarets and arcading. The governmental buildings conceived in laying out the city included in the original plans are some 1,600 houses for government officers of all ranks and 12,000 more for clerks. This, of course, is only the beginning. Complete systems of streets and highways, with the necessary public utilities, are being constructed with ample provision for recreation grounds such as cricket and football fields. Churches and public assembly halls are contemplated and ultimately, but this may be far in the future, a fully equipped university plant, will serve as the capstone of the great undertaking. The rate at which all these schemes can be realized depends wholly upon financial exigencies.
