THE I. C. R. COAL SUPPLY.
Hon Mr. Emmerson deserves credit for the measures he has taken to protect the country from being plundered by the coal companies that supply the Government Railways. The St. John Sun, which apparently speaks by the book, tells that last year when several coal companies in Nova Scotia combined to fix a high price, the minister refused to accept their first tenders and so saved the country \$75,000. Now the war is on again. The Halifax Chronicle tells that according to custom the mine operators recently met and agreed upon a price they would charge the Government road for coal, and later they tendered accordingly. The Minister promptly refused their bids and informed them that unless they were prepared to name reasonable prices he had his arrangements all ready to look elsewhere for a supply. It is now up to the coal operators to name a fair price or have the intercolonial supplied from Wales and the United States. There is little doubt what they will do.
Our Canadian coal barons want too much. They want to be paid by the Government with a duty that shuts out fair competition and then turn round and plunder the Government that protects them. The people have been paying the increased price for their coal caused by the duty, and also paying for the plunder extorted from the Government road. Mr. Emmerson appears to have the courage to take a grip with these magnates, and the prospects are that the intercolonial will get its coal as cheaply as the company roads have been getting it all along.

PROHIBITION IN KING'S.
A good friend of prohibition in King's writes us that the law is being violated in several centres of that County, and that the need for the appointment of a Prosecutor has become imperative. Our correspondent admits that the choice of a man for the position is a somewhat difficult one, and suggests that conflicting recommendations may have been accountable for the delay in making an appointment.
Not knowing the local circumstances fully we can only say that an early appointment of a Prosecutor seems to be important and it is equally or even more important that the best man shall be selected. Not every good temperance man will make an efficient prosecutor, and not every man who desires the appointment, or whose friends desire to get him a place is qualified for this difficult position. Energy, alertness, activity, a thorough knowledge of the law, a good knowledge of human nature, and great carefulness in avoiding mistakes are among the obvious requisites for the position.
We regret the delay in making an appointment. At the same time it is better that there should be some delay than that a wrong appointment should be made. The King's County Alliance and the Provincial Alliance will do well to give this matter their earnest attention and also, if possible have it arranged that the prosecutors for each county shall, as far as may be, act under the general supervision and direction of one experienced and efficient head. Premier Peters and his colleagues, will, we confidently believe, second the well-considered recommendations of the friends of the law in these matters.

EDITOR'S MAIL.
Sir-In one of your issues last week a Darnley correspondent mentioned the injury being wrought to the wheat crop in that vicinity. Last summer, samples of wheat from the affected districts of Sea View, Irishtown and Spring Valley were sent to Professor Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist, Ottawa. His reply was posted in Iion Peter McNutt's store. Malpeque, for all to read. He stated that he found the samples to be infested with three of the worst known enemies to the wheat plant, (1) Wheat midge, commonly called weevil, (2) joint worm, (3) hessian fly.
He recommended certain remedies, - burning chaff and screenings, and even burning of all grasses round the edges of fields.
Yet no one, so far as I know, attempted these cures.
This year, we find a much earlier destruction of the wheat crop, over a larger area from French River to Malpeque, and spreading south into the interior of the Island.
Last week, a large farmer told me he would give me his whole seven acres of wheat to send away this year.
The situation calls for some speedy and heroic treatment. Two thousand dollars judiciously expended now by either government might stay the plague, and much benefit would result to the whole Province. Would you not advise that our Executive Council take the matter up at once and come to the assistance of the farmers with information and effectual remedies? Full knowledge of all these pests can be obtained from Bulletin No 32, issued by Professor Fletcher last year.
I have written briefly knowing your space to be limited, but I am confident that you will find and publish other valuable information on such an important subject.
Let me say, in conclusion, that Ragmont, or "Stinking Willie" is also to be found in Sea View, Darnley and on the border between Malpeque and Baltic.
