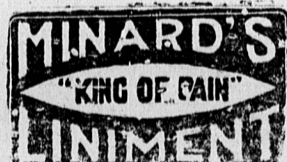

### RUSSIANS WANT STRAITS OPENED

MOSCOW, Oct. 10.—The Russian Soviet Government has sent a note to Britain, France and Italy protesting against the blockade of the Dardanelles and insisting upon the removal of all restrictions to the free passage of trading ships through the straits.

Categorically protesting against the blockade fixed by England without Russia's knowledge and against Russia's interests," the note cites that this action was taken while Russia was endeavoring to re-establish her own economic system, destroyed by war and intervention, and after unsuccessful attempts by the European countries to re-establish the world's economic systems through the Geneva and Hague conferences.
