THE NEW CATHEDRAL.—The completion of St. Dunstan's Cathedral is now in the hands of the Episcopal Corporation. The greater part of the plastering in the basement has been done; nothing now remaining in the main basement to be accomplished but the finishing of the capitals. In the sanctuary the altars have been set up and are of scagliola, a species of imitation marble.

The hardwood flooring in the Sanctuary is about completed, and the carpenters will start putting down the floorboards underneath the pews in the main basement to-day. The basement aisles and wainscottings will be of finished cement. It is hoped to hold service in the basement of the Cathedral by Christmas.
