VACANT SENATORSHIP AND FINANCES WERE DISCUSSED

(Continued from page 1.) regard which are now being denied.

MR. McPHEE said the Legislature had nothing to do with the vacancy in the Senate. That was a matter for our federal representatives. The crops had been good (laughter) and business was prosperous. The Opposition were evidently groaning inwardly to think that another Liberal would soon be appointed to the Senate, but professed great zeal to have the appointment made.

MR. MATHIESON moved, seconded by Mr. McNeill, an amendment to the amendment. He explained the object was to restore the application to the Governor General who was the proper appointing power. He contended that the House had the right and the duty to deal with this matter, being one of the parties to the union compact. He felt it was humiliating, a sad and sickening thing, that when our rights were being taken away the Government were not only consenting parties thereto but extending the act of wrong-doing. Our grandfathers would not have submitted to such things. Could nothing arouse the Government to a sense of their duty. The Dominion Government look after their side of the contract very well. Here the Government had done the wrong, the action by which our rights are taken away. He read from The Patriot that when the Ottawa Government is good and ready these appointments will be made. Any one adopting that doctrine had lost the spirit of a freeman and sunk to the level of a coward and a slave.

MR. COX protested against the words "cowards and slaves." There were no cowards on that side of the House.

MR. MATHIESON explained he had not applied it to the members, who, he hoped, would not subscribe to that doctrine.

MR. COX did not approve of the words "when it is good and ready." Those words were not in the motion moved by the leader of the Opposition. He thought the leader of the Opposition had shown a bad example in the use of strong language.

MR. ARSENAULT recalled that he had moved the original resolution and had followed the exact terms of the B. N. A. Act. The Government sought to block this by an amendment, to which the second amendment was now moved by Mr. Mathieson.

MR. McLEAN pointed out that the Government amendment was to send the address, not to the Governor General, but to the Government at Ottawa who are the parties at fault. The member for West River took it for granted that the Ottawa Government would only appoint some one that was not good. They would do they could only get the support of the country by a decent regard for our rights.

oming from different sections of the province those who attended would come enthused with the principles taught them and would, on their return to their homes, teach these to others. He claimed that the maintenance of a high standard of health should meet with the support of all classes of the community, and spoke of what other provinces had done to the end. He said that since the hardships were at present supporting three hospitals in this Province it was time the federal, provincial and vic authorities took a hand.

In closing he moved that a committee be appointed to wait on the City Council to present the views of the Association and ask for a grant along the lines suggested and also that the same committee be instructed to wait on the Provincial government.

He was followed by Rev. T. F. Fullerton who seconded the former speaker's motion respecting the union and equipment of a sanatorium. He said the people did not realize their responsibility in the gospel of health but in turning to the different governments for assistance he felt that the Association would meet with a satisfactory response. He emphasized human life as the most valuable asset of a country.

Dr. H. D. Johnson followed, supporting Mr. Tidmarsh's resolution. The doctor dealt with the use and objects of the proposed sanatorium and spoke of the prevention and cure of the dread disease, touching on primary education, food supply, inspection of milk and meat, inspection of public buildings, etc. When Dr. Johnson concluded the resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

Mr. Simpson then introduced a resolution expressing the appreciation of the Association of the action of the City Council in passing the by-laws respecting meat and inspection and expectoration for a rigid enforcement of the law. Canon Simpson spoke at length regarding impure meat supply and pointed out that under the present system of inspection the good meat was exported to the cities of this Province and the while citizens of this Province were subjected to the doubtful variety. He then proposed that the subject of expectation be being rigidly enforced the law was of only one arrest for this offence since the by-law was passed.

He said that boys and men were expected around the streets and peering into the harem skirt, commending the one thing; the absence of trailing material which collected in the gutter and spread it in the gutter.

W. E. Bentley, in a brief speech seconded Canon Simpson's resolution and on its being put to the meeting it was carried.

The morning session opened at 11 a. m. in the Board of Trade Rooms. The president, Dr. MacLaughlin, in his report said that the distribution of literature was not up to the mark but that lectures were being more appreciated. He said that the pioneer work had been nearly over for this society and that people were waking up to the fact that stronger preventive measures, must be taken.

A committee consisting of Dr. McLaughlin, Dr. Johnson, and W. F. Tidmarsh, was appointed to arrange for the printing of a pamphlet, a catalogue in the schools.

A question rose as to whether doctors in the country must disclose the names of their patients quarterly from tuberculosis in their quarterly reports. A resolution was passed stating that the subsidiary ranches should supply all the details asked for on the understanding that the information would be received strictly private, and placed in charge of a committee of the medical men, who in their public reports would omit everything that would reveal the identity of the patient. The committee consists of Drs. McLaughlin, Johnson and Jenkins.

The election of officers, owing to the absence of delegates from the branches outside the city, was deferred until the June meeting.
