A SUMMERSIDE BOY MEETS A SAD DEATH AT BRISTOL, R. I.

Accidentally Shot by His Brother Floyd Huestis While at Target Practice—The Weapon Was Discharged and the Bullet Entered the Left Chest, Passed Through the Lungs and Pierced Main Artery Connecting With Heart.

The following are the particulars of the shooting accident by which Harry W. Huestis lost his life. The deceased was a grandson of Thomas Huestis and nephew of W. N. Huestis of Summerside. His father formerly resided in that town. Yesterday Dec. 19, on the premises of his father's home on Bradford street, Bristol, Harry W. Huestis, 17 years of age, was accidentally shot by a bullet from a rifle in the hands of his younger brother, J. Floyd Huestis, the brothers being in the yard at the home practising at a target. The young man died almost instantly when hit by the bullet but was able to recognize his mother before life was extinct.

The shock in Bristol, where Henry Winfield Huestis was well known and universally liked, was extreme when so young a victim of the fatal accident was known in the community. His younger brother, in whose hands the rifle was when the charge was exploded prematurely, is almost distracted, and yesterday forenoon could not be comforted. He is 14 years of age.

The Huestis boys, Harry and Floyd, sons of Thomas Huestis, a machinist employed at the factory of the National India Rubber Company in Bristol, before going to school decided to have some target practice with a Stephens 22-calibre rifle and had been firing at short range at the target a short time before the fatal happening.

Harry proved a good marksman, judging from what was heard by people living in the neighborhood. The boys were heard talking with more or less enthusiasm as the bullets went close to the mark.

Floyd took the gun, and, having tried it previously, decided on fancy shooting. He was in a stooping position, with Harry some yards distant, when the sleeve of his sweater, he says, caught on the trigger, which was one of the most sensitive kind and the next thing came the cry of pain and the staggering of Harry.

Rev. T. Newton Owen, who lives in the next house to the Huestis family, went to the young man's assistance, and with the latter's mother carried him into the house. The boy was dying, and when he reached the house life was extinct.

Harry W. Huestis was a student in the senior class of the Bristol High School. He was a member of the Y. M. C. A., and took active part in athletics in the gymnasium in that building. He was employed occasionally as clerk in the clothing store by William M. Conery on Hope street, Bristol, and had sold evening papers.
