**In Memoriam**  
**MR. DANIEL NOONAN**  
The residents of Payton, Sask., were shocked to learn of the death of Dan Noonan at his home in Payton on Dec. 21 from a sudden heart attack.  
The late Mr. Noonan was born in Prince Edward Island in 1866, was married to Miss Minnie Murphy at Wellington in 1896 and moved to Payton in 1906, being one of the early pioneers of this district and his passing is a great loss to this community. His name is another added to the long list of successful Islanders abroad.  
Mr. Noonan was a Knight of St. Columba, Badleford branch, and was an earnest member of the Roman Catholic Church. He greatly assisted towards getting St. Regis Church built at Payton in 1922. For many years he was Mayor of Payton and was always ready to help in any community undertakings.  
He leaves his widow, two sons, John B. Medicine Hat, Vernon, Payton, and six daughters, Mrs. Joe Guinan of Delmar, Mrs. Hodgson of Saskatoon, Mrs. J. Wrenow of Maldstone, Sister Delphina of Holy Family Hospital, Prince Albert, Sister Alma of Convent of the Child Jesus, North Badleford, and Miss R. R., of Holy Family Hospital, Prince Albert. He is also survived by two brothers, namely, Thomas, on the homestead at Richmond, P. E. Island, and Alfred, Maine, and four sisters of Boston, Mass.

**Churchill Doubts Hitler's Professions**  
**BUCHURST HILL, Essex, Eng., Feb. 2**—(CP-Havas)—The Royal Navy, if Britain has the word will of the United States, is strong enough to rule the oceans of the world, Winston Churchill declared in a speech in which he expressed scepticism over Chancellor Hitler's prediction of "a long peace."  
He said the fall of Barcelona was the latest in a series of hammer blows at democracy in Europe and added he wished he could be sure a steady flow of munitions and supplies is not being sent from the recently conquered or dominated German territories toward Hungary and perhaps beyond, or that a similar stream is not moving southwards into Italy.  
"I wish I could feel sure the great numbers of German troops which were mobilized in September for six years, in and out of parliament, continually pleaded for fast British rearmament to keep pace with Germany, particularly the field of air strength and supply of munitions."  
He welcomed and reiterated Earl Baldwin's recent assertion that Britain "will fight with the unanimity of all classes and all ranks that has never been seen in any war that has yet taken place." If she has to enter a war for the "liberty of the human spirit."  
"Let keenly do I welcome the keen endorsement which Prime Minister Chamberlain gave a few weeks ago to President Roosevelt's daring declaration against the desire of any nations to rule the world by force. Mr. Churchill went on. He praised the increasing reinforcement of the "bonds of union between the British Empire and the Republic of France."

**Too Heavy Over-Finished Hogs**  
During the past few months there has been evidence of a tendency on the part of hog producers to hold their hogs till they reach a weight which has reached serious proportions with the result that packers are experiencing great difficulty in moving the finished products from such hogs even at heavy discounts.  
Every farmer knows, or should know, that the level and the stability of Canadian hog prices depends on the price which the British consumer will pay for Canadian bacon. Only carcasses with a set range of weights and finish will command top prices in England. Heavy, light, over-fat or unfinished carcasses are at a heavy discount.  
At present Canadian bacon is selling wholesale in England at a price range from 74 to 84 shillings per long hundred weight. Converted in terms of Canadian money, this amounts to about .15c to .17 1/4c per pound, or a spread of .2 1/4c per pound.  
Let us take a hypothetical case of a hog which weighed 250 lbs. alive and yields about 187 lbs. dressed. Such a hog should give two which're bacon sides totalling about 150 lbs. If this bacon sells at a discount of 2 1/4c on the British market, the total cut on this hog amounts to \$4.12. When the packers are flooded with such heavy carcasses they immediately protect themselves by lowering the general market price of hogs in Canada. In this way hog producers suffer from their own carelessness in shipping hogs which dress over 170 lbs.  
Even the home market refuses

to absorb any number of heavy carcasses except at a discount. The matter of over-finish is also serious at present. Even hogs with in the desired weights are now showing too much finish. This lowers the grade of the exportable carcass, and in turn lowers the price. For the home market, packers are compelled to trim such carcasses to remove this excess fat from the various cuts. This in turn lowers the value of the hog to the farmer.  
If our hog producers continue to show such carelessness in regard to weights it may be necessary for the packers to emphasize the point by placing a cut on all hogs dressing over 170 lbs. hog weight. At present there is no cut on hogs dressing between 170 and 188 lbs. If such hogs are of reasonably good type and finish, shippers are taking advantage of this in that they are marketing a great number of hogs within these weights. If our hog producers continue to show such carelessness or indifference to weights the packers will be compelled to place a cut on all hogs dressing over 170 lbs. To avoid this possibility every farmer should use the scales before shipping his hogs. The objective should be to keep all hogs between 200-220 lbs. live weight at shipping time. This weighing should be done in the morning before the hogs are fed, otherwise the weight will be misleading.  
In some sections of this province a number of farmers are deliberately breeding their sows to bear piglets which are not bacon type. This results in a high percentage of "C" grade hogs from such districts. Every farmer should know that such breeds as Duroc Jersey, English Black, Chester White, Poland China, and in many cases the Berkshire are not bacon type breeds and do not produce top grade exportable carcasses. **LARGEST CONCRETE BRIDGE SPANS IN WORLD**  
TORONTO, Feb. 2—The biggest concrete bridge spans ever built in the world are now being poured, cast and lowered into position for the new subway under construction at 18th Street, New Toronto. Designed by Chas. P. Disney, bridge engineer, Central Region, C. N. R. Six of these huge concrete slabs have already been hoisted into position during the past three days and the remaining four will be finished by tomorrow night. Each unit of these gigantic pre-cast concrete slabs weighs 130 tons. They are 80 feet long, almost a yard deep and six and half feet wide. They were cast in huge forms beside the railway tracks while trains rumbled past.
