POLICE COMMITTEE

Submitted by Coun. N. W. Lowther. Attached is a very complete report from Chief of Police Birrtwistle (published Saturday) covering the work of the Police Force for 1946 and the report will give full details of the work done and I need not add anything to it.

Four Committee adds its tribute to Sergeant Allan J. McManis who served the City faithfully and well for many years, and it also pays its tribute to the members of our efficient Police Force for the splendid way in which they carried out their duties in a manner that is most praiseworthy. The Charlottetown Police Force takes second place to none in neatness of appearance and courtesy in carrying out its many duties.

"Although we kept well within our estimates for the year it may be noted that police expenditures have increased from \$16,691.52 in 1945 to the sum of 26,411.32 in 1946 although it may be pointed out that the Force was fully equipped with uniforms in the past year as it had not been possible to do this in the preceding year.

Traffic Problem

"Traffic in Charlottetown still continues to be an ever increasing problem and your Committee dealt with the problems to the best of its ability during the year but much remains to be done. The marking of non-parking spaces on our streets has not been satisfactory and is too costly and must be improved during the coming year.

"The Committee was requested by the School Improvement League to raise an auxiliary force of police traffic police from the personnel of the City Schools and after full investigation we put this into effect. It has proven highly satisfactory and the boys from West Kent School have received praise from every quarter for the very efficient way they have handled traffic near their schools during the noon hour and after school. The Charlottetown Gyro Club has associated themselves in this splendid youth project and recently invited the members of the School Traffic Police Force to their dinner meeting to do honour to these boys for their spirit of good citizenship.

Prohibition Enforcement

"Your Committee has held many meetings during the year and many of these concerned themselves with the enforcement of the Prohibition Act in the City. We invited the Attorney-General and the R.C.M.P. to meet with us to discuss the problem and offered every assistance within our power. Corporal A. J. Lund has been appointed to do special work as head of an enforcement Squad of three men and he has been actively engaged in endeavouring to suppress the bootleggers and your Committee is quite satisfied with the work of this Squad and feels that it will continue to do good work.

"During the year Major W. A. Smith of the City Police Court was appointed secretary of your Committee and he has been of great assistance to your Committee and we feel we could not have secured a better man for the position. As a result of inquiries made by your Committee we learned that we could, at small cost, send one of our senior sergeants to attend a three months course in police work at the R.C.M.P. College at Rockcliffe. We recommended Sergeant A. J. Dowling for the first class and he is now attending this course. We plan on having him instruct the younger members of the Force in police duties as we felt it was most unfair to appoint a new constable and leave him to carry on without complete instruction in the duties of a police officer.

"My thanks are extended to the other members of the Police Committee, namely Councillors C. M. Cox and D. E. Noonan for their full co-operation on every occasion and for their attendance at our many meetings during the year. They are a splendid committee to work with and we were in full accord during the year. My thanks also are extended to Chief Birrtwistle and all members of the Force for the splendid way they have co-operated with us during the year and your Committee also desires to thank Your Worship and Magistrate Martin for your ever ready willingness to carry out suggested improvements for the betterment of the policing of our City and we are also indebted to all members of the Council for their consideration of all suggestions made by the Committee."
