New Machine Will Record Heart Action

CHICAGO, April 25—(AP)—Development of a new machine that records the pumping action of the human heart for a detailed study of any abnormalities was announced today in the American Journal of Roentgenology and Radium Therapy.

The instrument is the electrokymograph, or E-K-Y for short. Dr. George C. Henny, professor of medical physics at Temple University Medical School in Philadelphia, where the machine was developed, said it would not displace the electrocardiograph but augment its work.

He said the E-K-Y gave "different, but very helpful" information and added there was every indication the new instrument soon would have "practical value" in the study of heart disease.

When a patient stands before an ordinary fluoroscope attached to the machine, a distinct shadow of the beating heart is seen. Using a photo-electric tube, the E-K-Y observes the movements of the edge of the heart shadow, transforming them into changing electric current. The fluctuations

Tryon Parish Has Fine Tradition

Picturesquely situated on the east bank of Tryon River is the Tryon United Church and it is the third erection on that site, the land being donated originally by John Lord.

Tryon is one of the oldest settlements of the Province. The first British immigrants were brought out in 1770 by Captain Samuel Holland, Surveyor General in British America, who had drawn Lot 28 in the grand lottery of 1767, when Prince Edward Island was presented in twenty-thousand-acre lots in one day to those especially favored by His Majesty George III.

In 1792 Reverend William Grandin conducted the first revival services on the Island at Tryon in a log house of Nathaniel Wright, on what is now known as the Austin Smith farm.

Through his preaching, Mr. Wright, a Loyalist who had landed in 1784, became a convert and was later known as the father of Methodism in Prince County. Reverend William Black, through the influence of Mr. Wright, visited the province in 1794 and was instrumental in organizing a Society of twenty members.

Tryon and Bedeque were included in the Charlottetown circuit until 1817 when they became a separate charge with Reverend John Fishpool as pastor, under whom the first church was built.

John Lord of Tryon River granted a little over an acre of land to twelve trustees, who were committed to pay Holland's six pence per annum rent for the church land under the 999 year lease.

The trustees were: William Barker, John Clark, Michael Clark, John Leard, John Lord, James MacWilliams, John MacWilliams, Charles Muttart, George Muttart, Joseph Wood, W. Wood, Jr., William Wright. Descendants of those men are still prominent in the United Church. There being no money, it was agreed that a Methodist chapel could be built by labor and love.

Some of the men agreed to supply sufficient squared timber; others, boards, handwrought nails and days' work.

Log Church Erected

In 1817, a neat log church was erected on the Lord farm, near the first graveyard in which a number of the early fathers slept, as well as the French pioneers.

This early church, the third Methodist Meeting House on Prince Edward Island, had no windows, pulpit, nor interior finish. Glass plaster and paint were very scarce.

The different parishes, where Reverend John Fishpool preached, gave financial help to this Methodist church. Rev. Fitzgerald, an Irish Franciscan priest, and a special friend of John Wesley, contributed a high pulpit. From 1817 to 1882 this circuit was under the charge of thirty superintendents. The Sabbath School was established in 1821 by Walter Johnstone of Dumfries, Scotland.

This first church became too small for the increasing congregation and, under Reverend Thomas H. Davies, it was decided to build anew. The chapel was erected in 1839, newly square in shape with barrack roof and stood on the same site as the present church with the entrance facing the south. It was the custom of that time to sell the pews of a new church and to collect new rental yearly thereafter.

Reverend J. S. Phinney, in 1879 realizing the pressing need of more adequate church accommodation, preached with impassioned earnestness on the text, "Rise and Build."
